After the boy's arrival be went to work with a will, and showed a disposition that was not bad. About three weeks ago he was stricken with ty-phoid fever from which he died Sun-day. The funeral will be a public one and will be conducted by Rev. Shulse on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock The remains will be interred in the ourrying ground set apart for that institution, just east of the prison. This is the first public funeral that has ever been held from the penitentiary for a prisoner.
