Steamer Eugene Arrives.

The new steamer "Eugene," arrived at the river bridge at 1 o'clock this afternoon. The board of track committee, consisting of E. J. McClanahan and E. J. Fraser, was taken down the river in a row boat this morning by two boys, C. Marx and E. E. McClanahan. The steamer was met near the Meek warehouse, about 14 miles below here.

Capt. R. J. Young is master and Capt. Bell Pilot. Capt. F. B. Jones, the owner of the boat, is acting mate. A. B. Peoples is purser, R. Montgomery chief engineer and Geo. C. Walker assistant. The crew altogether consists of 12 men.

A number of passengers came up from Portland and way points. Forty tons of freight were brought, most of it from Portland, but several tons of flour and feed were taken on at Corvallis. With this load the boat drew only about 16 inches of water. Captain Young states that no trouble was experienced after the wheel was set lower into the water. On the upper river the boat was subjected to severe and unnecessary tests in several bad places in the stream, but no strain was noticeable.

The crew have been busy all the afternoon unloading freight and in the morning the boat will be put in shape for the exercises which will take place tomorrow afternoon. The time set for the presentation is 2 o'clock. The band will take its place at the head of the procession, on the corner of Eighth and Washington streets, and proceed to the boat near the river bridge, where the following program will be rendered:

Music by the Eugene Band; selected. Speech and presentation of flags to steamer, by Hon. F. M. Wilkins, president of the Eugene Board of Trade.

Three cheers for the American flag by pupils of Eugene public schools, who will also give three cheers for the steamer Eugene.

Response, by Capt. Jones. Christening of steamer Eugene, by Miss Carrie Friendly.

Music, "Star Spangled Banner," by Eugene Band.

Address by the Mayor of Eugene, Hon. S. H. Friendly.

Response, by Hon. C. A. Woodcock. Music by Eugene Band.

Opening of steamer for public inspection.

Ruby Hendricks, Nina Wilkins and Ina Craig will carry the three flags for the steamer.

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ANOTHER SHOOTING.

A Vagrant Wishes Shelter and Strives for Confinement. A man giving his name as James Slayton was lodged in the county jail Wednesday by Sheriff Noland. The man is a stranger who arrived in town about a week ago and has since divided his time between begging food in the city and making short excursions into the country, as he says, to find work. He called at the residence of S. D. Holt yesterday morning and asked for food which was refused him. He went away but returned again, finding Mr. Holt in the garden trimming hedges. He proceeded to abuse that gentleman and went away again. He says he went out into the country a few miles, returning to town shortly before 6 o'clock. This time he passed the Holt residence and pulling a 32-calibre revolver from his pocket fired a shot into the front gate post.

The shot attracted the attention of the neighbors, who followed the man into the business portion of the town. Here he was apprehended by E. J. McClanahan and delivered over to Sheriff Noland. The sheriff secured the revolver and in response to a query as to his intent, Slayton said he "wanted to mark the place."

The man is about 27 years of age and from what could be gathered during an interview this morning, was evidently feeling desperate. He was willing to stay in jail and evidently hoped to get food and shelter by creating some disturbance. He is not a rough looking man, but exposure to rough weather and irregularity in eating and sleeping have caused a feeling of abandonment. He has been lodged in the city jail two nights lately.
