Not at All-Hungary. NEW YORK, March 23.—The Hungarian flag will not fly on the city hall upon the occasion of the funeral of Kosuth. Acting Mayor McClellan cannot find a precedent for hanging the American flag at half-mast upon the occasion of the death of any one not a citizen of America.

A New Messiah. DUBUQUE, Ia., March 23.—A new "Messiah" has made his appearance at Boystary Hollow, opposite this city. He says his mission is to exterminate the Pope and all Catholics, and to remove the Sagas and Vanderbilts.

The Pressure on Grover. ST. LOUIS, March 24.—A petition signed by all the bankers and trust companies in this city and by a large number of leading merchants and business men was mailed to President Cleveland tonight, urging him to veto the seigniorage bill.

New Trials Denied. PORTLAND, Or., March 24.—Judge Bellinger in the United States district court this morning rendered a decision denying the motion for a new trial in the case of the United States vs. C. J. Mulkey, William Dunbar and P. J. Brannon.

In a circular issued by the California board of health the following is addressed to principals and teachers in the public schools: "To be an habitual smoker of manufactured cigarettes is to be an opium smoker, and a habitual opium smoker cannot be the equal of an opium smoker, unless he is doing otherwise." Under no circumstances should a pupil be allowed to smoke in any school, on the way to and from school, or at home, if the teacher, by admonition, advice, precept, example, or by influence can prevent it.
