BRICK BELLADONNA.

An Independence Man's Narrow Escape.

Salem Independent: On last Saturday evening, R. Shelby entered the drug store of Alexander & Cooper, at Independence, and asked the druggist in charge of the store, for a bottle of belladonna. As Mr. Shelby was well known in that city, little thought was given the matter, and the druggist gave the gentleman the deadly night shade asked for; however, he did not fail to inquire in a joking way, if he contemplated suicide. Mr. Shelby took the poison home and drank the entire contents. He was immediately taken with cramps with which he suffered for some time before medical assistance was secured. As quickly as possible an opiate was administered which relieved his sufferings considerably and a stomach pump was brought into use. It took the untiring efforts of physicians all of Saturday night and Sunday before the poison was cleansed from his system. He is yet in a delicate condition, but his survival is anticipated. When the poison was purchased Mr. Shelby enquired if half of the contents of the bottle would cause death or not, and he was assured that it would; but instead of taking half of it he drank the entire contents. Mr. Shelby claimed, after he had been extracted from the jaws of death, that he was suffering excruciating pain from neuralgia, and that he took the poison to alleviate the pain. His friends claim also that it was done without suicidal intent, but that it was merely a mistake made while temporarily deranged caused by his intense sufferings.
