W. G. Purkerson is visiting relatives at Junction. A petition has been returned to Cyrus M. Dungan. The made are now said to be in a good condition. Considerable wood is already being hauled to town.

The county canvassers are at the head of tide today. The river is rising slowly on occasion of the melting snow. There are more beautiful laws in Eugene than ever before. Drummers are now plentiful. A sure sign of returning prosperity. Business unusually quiet around the Court house and city hall today.

A city election was held at Grants Pass yesterday. The democrats elected the mayor. The funeral of the late L. R. Robinson occurred this afternoon near Irwin. The Eugene road supervisors are now working the roads with a good force of men.

A. C. Jennings has been summoned to appear as a U. S. grand juror at Portland, May 23rd. The hold-over senators are divided thus politically: Democrats, 7; republicans, 7; people, 1. O. A. Phelps will deliver a number of populist speeches throughout Lane county during the month.

The steamer Eugene left Portland for this city this morning. She will be due here Thursday afternoon. George Morey, the Portland murderer, has been again sentenced to be hanged. The day set is June 22nd. Eugene needs a flooring mill badly, and the proposition should be accepted if the money can possibly be raised.

The Cumberland Presbyterian general assembly meets here one week from tomorrow. Willard hall will be used for the exercises. The funeral sermon of the late Mrs. M. E. Hixson will be preached at the Oak Hill cemetery on the 30th of May. All friends are invited.

CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIANS. The General Assembly Will Meet in Eugene on May 16-25.

On the 16th of May will occur the largest and most important assemblage ever held in the Upper Willamette, in the meeting of the general assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, at Eugene, Oregon. The assembly will be composed of one minister and one elder from each of the presbyteries all over the union and will probably include representatives from the United States of Scotland. Besides these, a large number of the members of the church in various portions of the country will avail themselves of this opportunity of seeing the great Northwest, and at the same time being at the sitting of the greatest church court in their denomination.

The assembly will come over the Union Pacific route, and Oregon Short Line, and will be met at The Dalles by a committee of reception on Tuesday the 15th. This committee is composed of representatives from Oregon synod and prominent citizens of Eugene. Arriving at Portland at 1 p. m., the assembly will be given a reception at the parlors of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. Here also, the tourists will have free transportation all over the city and will leave Portland about 3 p. m., arriving at Eugene at 7 a. m.

Free entertainment will be provided for all commissioners and their wives, as well as for all visitors east of the Rocky mountains. The churches and citizens of Eugene have responded very liberally to the aid of the Eugene pastor, Rev. G. A. Blair and his people. The assembly will be preceded on Wednesday by the Annual Missionary Rally, but the Assembly proper will open on Thursday evening with a sermon by the Rev. W. T. Ferguson, D. D., of Illinois, the retiring moderator. The sessions will be held in Willard hall of the University of Oregon, and will continue about ten days. The Cumberland Presbyterian pulpits of the valley will largely be filled by commissioners, on the Sunday of assembly week.

Osburn-Irandon. Athens Press: On Wednesday evening at the residence of Hon. T. J. Kirk in Athens, George C. Osburn and Miss Amanda Irandon were united in marriage. Rev. W. W. Brannin of Pocatello officiating. The wedding was a quiet one, only a few friends being invited. Promptly at 8 o'clock the happy couple entered the parlor where the guests were assembled, and were united by Rev. Brannin with a brief but impressive ceremony, after which all repaired to the dining room where a most sumptuous supper was served. Miss Anna Kirk and some young friends entertained the company with some excellent selections of music. Taken altogether, it was an ideal wedding.

QUITE A SCHEME.—Salem Journal: The number of schemes for extracting lace out of candidates is unlimited. The latest arrival in the city is Herr Moses Blumenthal, of Stiglitz or San Francisco, who has "an elegant shooever," to be posted all over the county. The candidates are all worked for from 50 cents upward and often threatened with annihilation if they do not stand in. In the meanwhile the Salem press supports these candidates the year through and loyally defend party interests at every point. Great is politics and greater is the slinger from Stiglitz.

A MARKED CONTRAST.—Jacksonville Times: There is a marked contrast between the democratic and republican nominees for superintendent of public instruction. Prof. Reid, the democratic nominee, is an able, practical educator and has been for several years principal of the public schools of Eugene. He will receive the support of a large majority of the teachers of the state, regardless of politics. Irwin, his opponent, has no qualifications for the position, for, instead of being a teacher, he is simply a preacher with a continued itching for office.

ORIGON PIONEER REUNION.—Extensive arrangements are being made by the committee having the matter in charge, to properly celebrate Pioneer day. This celebration will be held in Portland on June 15th. A very interesting time is expected. This will be the 22d reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association since its organization. Hon. Thos. A. Tongue, of Washington county, will deliver the annual address, and Hon. T. E. Geer of Marion county, the occasional address. There will be a procession and other attractive features in connection with the reunion.
