THE CASCADE FOREST RESERVE The Proclamation Excluding the Bohemian Mining District.

Following is a copy of the president's proclamation setting apart the Bohemian mining district from the Cascade forest reserve:

WHEREAS, It is provided by section 24 of the act of congress, approved March 3, 1891, entitled, "An act to repeal timber-culture laws, and for other purposes," "That the president of the United States may, from time to time set apart and reserve, in any state or territory having public land bearing forests, in any part of the public lands wholly or in part covered with timber or under-growth, whether of commercial value or not, as public reservations, and the president shall by proclamation, declare the establishment of such reservations and the limits thereof;" and whereas, on the 28th day of September, 1893, I issued a proclamation reserving, as authorized, certain public lands in Oregon, now known as the "Cascade forest reserve," and

WHEREAS, The lands hereinbefore described are mineral lands, and should not have been included in said "Cascade forest reserve."

Now, therefore, I, Grover Cleveland, president of the United States, by virtue of the power in me vested by said act, do hereby issue this, my second proclamation, and hereby except from said "Cascade forest reserve" established on the 28th day of September, 1893, and restore to the public domain, all that tract of land situated in the state of Oregon, and described as follows, to wit:

"Beginning at the southeast corner of township 20 south, range 1 west, Willamette meridian; thence south 6 miles along the unsurveyed Willamette meridian; thence east 12 miles; thence north 12 miles; thence west 6 miles to the southeast corner of town ship 19 south, range 1 east; thence west 6 miles along the southern boundary of township 19 south, range 1 east; thence south along the eastern boundary of township 20 south, range 1 west, to the place of beginning, being those tracts of land which, when the public surveys are extended, will be described as township 20 south, ranges 1 and 2 east, and township 21 south, ranges 1 and 2 east, and, embracing as nearly as can be determined, the Bohemian mining district."
