AFTERNOON SESSION. (July Grand, June 21.)

G. C. T. James Kennedy, in his report, called attention to the increase in numbers which is largely due to the efforts of Prof. Crowhurst, who has been engaged in the lecture field.

Appropriation was recommended to furnish literature to juvenile temples. Supr. of Lecture Work W. S. James reported that Prof. W. Crowhurst began lecturing in the interest of the Order on April 4, and during the two and one-half months following he organized 12 new lodges and reorganized two subordinate and one district lodges, and 800 members have been added to the order.
