A RACE WITH DEATH.

Kingston Post. Between the Story of the Rescue at Hinkley.

West of Superior, Wis., Sept. 4.—Kingston William Beck, of the original rescuing passenger train on the Eastern Minnesota, tells the following of the rescue at Hinkley.

"Soon after leaving Superior, at 1:10 p. m., I had to light the headlight owing to the failure of the battery to turn on the lights.
