THE WAR CHESTS OF EUROPE

In his article on "The War Chests of Europe," published in the Nineteenth Century, Prof. attorney state vs Adkins. John M Williams deputy district attorney state vs Kreuiz Heinrich Geffeken says that Ger many has a war treasure of \$30,-000,000 in coined gold lying in the Walter Eakin is acting as second deputy sheriff at fifty dollars per mouth.

Prof. Geffeken has not been able to make an estimate of the total amount of currency thus put out of the reach of the world's trade, but it is undoubtedly large enough to have a very serious restrictive effeet.

A still more serious result of the preparation for war in time of peace is the permanent war debt rendered necessary by heavy pay ments for army, navy and pensions.

The war chest and the war debt taken together constitute the most serious obstacle now in the way of popular advancement. No form of land or commodity monopoly, bad as many of them are, is so oppressive to the earner as the restriction of the medium through which he must exchange his products-if he do it all-when this restriction is accompanied by an increasing burden of interest which must be paid out of his earnings.

This system of oppression is pe-culiarly modern. It is a result of the military imperialism which has taken the place of European feudalism.
