INSURANCE COMPANY SUED.—Mrs. Jennie E. Melcher, of Portland, has filed her complaint at Oregon City in a suit to recover \$1000 from the State Insurance Company, of Salem, that being the amount of the insurance on the Melcher residence, that burned July 11th last. The complaint alleges that the property destroyed was worth \$1,200. The insurance was written just three months before the fire. It is also alleged in the complaint that Toll Thompson, agent of the insurance on the Melcher residence, had entered into a conspiracy with one Gordon E. Hayes, one G. L. Story, and one H. E. Hayes, for the purpose of defrauding the plaintiff, and the circumstances are recited at length and substantially as told by Mrs. Melcher in the recent charge against Thompson, which she preferred against Judge Hayes and Thompson, which charge was dismissed. The only judgment prayed for now, however, is for the \$1000 insurance money, with interest from July 14th, when the proofs of loss are claimed to have been made.

A SILVERTON SCANDAL.—Salem Independent: A complaint was made against Mr. Armstrong, a resident of Prune Ridge, for criminal assault upon the latter's wife. The case came up Wednesday afternoon in the court, and created no little excitement, as it was the first case of the kind in twenty years in Silverton. Mr. Riley was the first witness called, but his evidence being only hearsay amounted to but little or nothing. Mrs. Riley, however, tried to make it warm for Mr. Armstrong, and the witness up to such an extent cross-examination, and discovered so many loopholes in her testimony that Armstrong was discharged.

THE PRUNE MARKET.—Today's Salem Statesman set over, and Clark went to Eugene and other up-valley points yesterday for the purpose of purchasing a lot of prunes for shipment East. One of Lane county's leading orchardists informs us that Mr. Clarke talked consignment, but made no money there.

THEO. A. C.—President J. M. Bloss, of the Oregon Agricultural College, at Corvallis, passed through this morning on his return home from Ashland where he has been in the presence of the meeting of the State Horticultural Association. Dr. Bloss reports the college as prosperous as could be wished. There are 225 students in the four years college course and 44 members of the '94. This institution has been steadily progressing since Dr. Bloss assumed charge, three years ago, and is now one of the educational institutions in which the people of the whole state of Oregon take great pride.

BIG FOOT RACE.—A foot race will be run at the Salem fair grounds track Saturday, October 27th, at 2 p. m., between Al Sampson of California, and T. H. W. Liddecoat of England. The race will be for \$1,000 a side, each man having already posted \$500. The distance will be seventy yards and one-half yard. Sampson allowing his opponent one and one-half yards start. The contest will be governed by Sheffield rules and it promises to be an exciting one.—Statesman. Sampson is the man who recently won the big race at Denver under the name of Henderson. RAIN GAUGE.—The local government station at the University of Oregon having been discontinued, Marshall Eastland will now serve as one-half inspector without pay. This morning he received a government rain gauge which he will place in position in a day or two.

COURT NEWS.

Justice Wheeler's Court Busy With a Large Docket.

During the three months just past 67 new cases have been commenced in Justice Wheeler's court. The court has been hard at work so far this week in hearing cases mostly of minor importance.

JUDGMENT WAS RENDERED yesterday in the case of Gray & Son vs. John Schmidt, to recover amount of balance of account. The finding finds the plaintiff entitled to \$6.30.

The case of John Schmidt vs. James Sinclair was tried yesterday. The suit was to recover an account and note. Judgment was given the plaintiff for amount of the note.

The suit of C. F. Hariburt vs. W. P. Eddis to recover rent, which was down for trial yesterday, was set over.

Suit was begun by E. Bostwick against Benjamin Goodman, this morning, to recover personal property.

The trial of the case of Lilly vs. Wood, to recover board money, was resumed and will probably reach a conclusion today.

SIDNEY HORN was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Eakin yesterday afternoon on a warrant issued by Justice Wheeler's court. The complaint upon which the warrant was issued was sworn to by A. J. Babb, and charges adultery with his wife, Louisa Babb, on July 13th, last. Horn not being able to furnish bonds remained in the custody of the deputy sheriff last night.

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
