Then a crowd of thousands determined to avenge his death and organized themselves into "Danites," or "destroying angels."

A large family named Williams had been mysteriously murdered, one at a time, until only two were left: Miss Nancy, the heroine of the play, and her little brother, George, aged 7.

They crossed the Missouri river and escaped, finally drifting into a mining camp in California, where the little boy while playing one day on the cliffs, was mysteriously shot; and the girl, Nancy, was supposed to have run, frightened, off the cliff, and falling into the river in the canyon below, was drowned.

The Danites were finally hung by the gruff, but honest miners, and Billy Pipet, a young boy, who had straggled into camp several years before, was found to be none other than the girl who had escaped the Danites vengeance.

Frank Hendrick and E. Alma Stutz were in the principal roles again last night, and of the rest of the company it would be unjust to mention one above another, for they are all artists.

This play is the production of the fertile brain of Joaquin Miller, the "poet of the Sierras." It adds another proof of his already well-known versatility and genius.

University Notes.

Last Saturday evening the Laureans selected Clarence Keene, Fred Mulkey and Lee Travis to represent them in a joint debate with the Philologists, which will take place some time in December. Harry Templeton, C. A. Woodson and one yet to be named will argue for the Philologists. The subject will be, "Resolved, That the situation today in America demands such an organization as the A. P. A." The Laureans, being the challenged party, will close the side of the question, and we understand have chosen the affirmative.

The football team, under the coaching of Mr. Church, is rapidly improving in both team and individual work and are now practicing in dead earnest. Mr. Church has proven himself to be a good coach and one who thoroughly understands the game. Some minor changes will probably be made in the make-up of the team.

Election Notes.

In Merced county, Cal., the democratic and republican candidates for county clerk died, each receiving 736 votes. A new election has been called for December 20, to settle the dispute.

Pugh, rep., is elected to congress from the ninth Kentucky district.

Up to last night died 1,200 plumbago, with 88 predicted to hear from, for governor of California. He is undoubtedly elected.

A GOOD RECORD—The following from the Corvallis Times tells about a record that includes important Oregon history: Judge F. A. Chenoweth is in attendance upon circuit court at Benton county. He now lives quietly on his farm in Kings valley, and although he is 75 years of age and his hair and beard are gray as the driven snow, he has within a few weeks split a thousand rails, hauled them out of the mountains and added them to the fences on his farm. Until 1862 the territory of Oregon included in its borders the region that is now the state of Washington. It was Judge Chenoweth who moved on the floor of the territorial legislature of that year what is now Washington to be set apart a separate territory. The opposition to this measure was led by the late J. C. Avery, but the measure was carried, and Judge Chenoweth was shortly thereafter created. In the winter of 1854 he was speaker of Washington's first legislature, where he was intimately associated with G. B. McClellan, subsequently commander-in-chief of the Union army, then an engineer on the staff of Washington's first governor, L. L. Stevens. In 1862 Judge Chenoweth returned to Corvallis, and in 1866 served as speaker of the house of representatives. At one time he was prosecuting attorney for this district.
