West, Feb. 1.

Uncle David Morse is falling quite rapidly of late. He has no one to care for him but his neighbors, who are doing all they can for his comfort.

The Roberts left Monday for Alsea to tow out the schooner Joseph and Henry, loaded with lumber for San Francisco. The tug also carried 1500 feet of lumber for Newport.

A special school meeting was called and held on the afternoon of Thurs day last at the school building and a tax of two mills was voted as follows: For part payment of seats, 1 mill; improvement of grounds, 1 mill.

The following circuit court cases were filed in the county clerk's office today:

David Cherry vs James R. Johnson. Suit in equity to foreclose a mortgage on real property. The mortgage is on 122 acres in Tp 20 S R 3 and 4 W, and the amount of judgment asked for is \$900.

Mitchell, Lewis & Staver Co., a corporation, vs G. M. Jackson. The plaintiff sues on a promissory note, asking judgment for \$247.02.

A. L. Lane vs J. C. Goodale. The plaintiff files for a judgment for \$180 and interest.

Some think there will be about \$20,000 worth of stock is held by Eugene people. The company met a great lack in the Washington fires, and also in eastern business, which could hardly be overcome.

Captain R. H. Parker to Resign.

At the meeting of company C, O. N. G., last evening Captain Parker gave notice of his intention to resign his position. The Captain has been for a considerable number of years a prominent factor in national guard circles in this state and does not care to longer maintain the duties and responsibilities of his position makes it necessary for him. LOCATING FIRES.

A Better Fire Alarm System Needed for Eugene.

The fire alarm system in Eugene as it stands at present is very defective, since there is no means of locating a fire after the alarm is turned in. From reliable sources we learn that a perfect system could be put in for \$1,500 or less. Let no motives of false economy deter our city fathers from making the necessary changes as soon as possible, when one touch of the button of a perfect fire alarm system might save the whole lot of improvement in a single hour. From three to five minutes is lost in beating each fire with our present system, think what a delay this would be in case some state or public school building should catch fire. Our fire companies do as fine work as can possibly be done under existing circumstances. Were they well equipped as they are well drilled and efficient in other ways Eugene would be in possession of a perfect system. The people are surprised at the promptness with which they respond to alarms; from chief to each individual fireman they work in the greatest harmony and perfection.

Losses From Indian Depredations Settled At Last By the Government.
