A PREDICTION MADE.

It Is Thought An Anti-Dolph Man Will Be Elected Tomorrow.

Legislation to Adjourn Saturday. SALEM, Feb. 21.—Salem is now all excitement over the senatorial situation.

The prospects are that there will be a heavy bolt tomorrow from King Caucus, and that an anti-Dolph man will be elected U. S. senator.

This afternoon the senate concurred with the house in the matter of final adjournment, which will take place at 12 o'clock Saturday night.

Smith's postage railway bill at the Dalles, passed the senate this morning.

As will be seen Dolph lost two votes. They were Speaker G. B. Moores of Marion, and Senator W. H. Hobson, of Marion.

A Failure.

Salem Journal, Rep: The failure of this legislature has been due to its nominal respect for duty.

The senate began the blockade tactics under the leadership of Multnomah senators, who gave notice that they would pocket and hang up all measures of the house to force members to support their charter and salary bills and senatorial schemes.

The house is nearly as bad. Three senate bills have passed it to create new judicial districts and new offices for lawyers, and the eastern Oregon asylum bill.
