REV. W. S. GILBERT EXPLAINS.

His Statement From the Pulpit Made on Authority of a "Promi-nent Citizen."-Who is He?

EUGENE, Or., April 11, 1895. EDITOR GUARD: In an editorial under title of "An Unfounded Statement," in your issue of Tuesday, you refer to a sermon preached by myself on Sunday morning. Seeing you have been misinformed as to the facts, I wish to ask the privilege of correction your columns.

The statement I made was this That a prominent citizen of our city had taken upon himself to secure an e-timate of the per cent of our citizens who were virtuous as to social purity. He had secured the judgment of fifteen men who would in his opinion be rep-resentative. The result ascertained was that, the average from the fifteen estimates was 20 per cent."

But even if, as you estimate in the 1d 50 editorial referred to, and as my own estimate was 80 per cent virtuous, it still leaves 20 per cent who are compromised. And even this condition of things, in my judgment, deserves the unsparing rebuke of all good citizens and merits no defense whatever.

ANOTHER UNFORTUNATE.

The Body of an Unknown Man Found in the River Near the West End of Skinner's Butte.

Daily Guard, April 11. As employes of the Eugene sawmill were gathering logs, that had broken away from the boom, shortly after one o'clock this afternoon, they discovered the body of a man hanging on a snag on the north bank a short distance above the Cheshire ferry.
