MORE WORK, LESS SURVEYS.

The Salem Statesman, in common with many others, is anxious that better work be done on Willamette river improvements. It says: "If Major Post's survey of the Willamette is no more fertile in results than his interviews are in satisfaction, Salem, and the up-river country may expect no good to be accomplished when upon final hearing congress acts upon the report of the engineers. The facts are, for years and years the government has been surveying and re-surveying the Willamette under one pretext or another, until a sufficient sum of money has been spent on surveys to have scraped every bar, pulled every snag and completed a revetment at every curve between Clackamas bottom and Skinner's Butte. But still we are encouraged—we are so easily encouraged—for the major holds out the fulsome information that, provided the stage of water permits, the snagboat may reach here sometime during May. When the old survey stakes and anchors will be pulled out and a new line run? This is all given with a proviso—that the very meager government appropriation is not all exhausted by that time, and that a new appropriation is made! This section is becoming very tired of surveys and ambiguous reports. What we want is for the government to get down to business and give us a navigable river."

The committee is to meet at Salem, Wednesday, May 8th.

The controversy between the state public buildings board and the Salem electric light company was compromised yesterday morning by the company consenting to a reduction of 200 lights from their bill for lighting the State House, the same not being used.

Henry Failing declined his appointment as commissioner to the Mexico City international fair. The governor has appointed Editor Pentland of the Independence West Side to succeed him.

Cornwallis Fawcett, 80 year old man, is left for M. Taylor, Onarville at Portland the surgeon declined to attempt another operation on account of his great weakness. A letter from him to Saturday's mail announced that he was too weak to walk on the mail after it had been written. He is expected home again in a day or two.

The Ping Yang school house on Mohawk, which was "bowed up by dynamite last sun night, is being rebuilt and studies will be resumed next Monday.

A father is in jail at Salem charged with the unnatural murder of his son.

The Durrant murder trial is still the sensation of San Francisco. The coroner is through with the inquest, and the preliminary examination has begun.

The republicans of the eastern states are rapidly getting on the gold standard platform. The three leading candidates, Harrison, McKinley and Reed are gold men.

The philanthropic Pullman company that caused the country so much trouble and expense last year has just decided the regular quarterly two per cent. dividend.

The Mohawk parties who have been endeavoring to destroy a school house are treading on dangerous ground. The state has an institution at Salem that is kept ready for such offenders.

The lumber industry in the Northwest, that was to be literally ruined by the repeal of the McKinley law, according to McKinley, Dulph and such statesmen, is in a better condition than for some years past.

Both Bradstreet and Dunn's reports of business for last week show decided improvement in all branches of business throughout the United States, and the feeling of confidence is rapidly being restored. The price of all farm products is increasing, and many new industries are being established in all parts of Uncle Sam's domain, which will cause money to circulate more freely. Notwithstanding the croakings of prophets to the contrary, 1895 gives promise of a most successful year as regards business.

A peculiar effect of the income tax law lately interpreted by the United States supreme court, is that the man who pays rent is taxed, while the man who receives it is not. Pullman is sure to contend that he rents his sleepers.

It may be all right for Uncle Sam to keep John Bull off the South American grass, but he should first be made to keep his hands off our financial policy, as though his manipulations silver has been demoralized and distress brought up in the matter.

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Recent developments show that Paul Schulze had ample reason to suicide at Tacoma, the other day, if reason there can be for committing self-murder. It has come to light he abused trusts imposed in him, and the defalcations amounted close to a million dollars.

The European land-grabbing powers are snarling and grumbling because they are not able to secure any territory out of the China-Japan imbroglio. Japan understands something of diplomacy and is likely to conduct affairs so as to allow no pretext for outside interference.

The supreme court of Michigan has just declared constitutional the "anti-fusion" act passed by the present legislature, which provided that a candidate for office, where he received the nomination from more than one party, should elect before a given date on which ticket he would run, and that, failing to do this, his name would be placed on the first ticket certified to, but in no case could said candidate appear more than once on the official ballot.

C. P. Huntington, president of Southern Pacific railroad, is under arrest for violation of the law. It is not the first time he has grossly violated the law, but before arrest was escaped. Of course the worshippers at the shrine of power feel greatly concerned over the annoyance to which the railroad magnate is subjected. Huntington is a self-confessed briber of members of congress, for which he was never called to account, and it does seem ridiculous to arrest him now for issuing a pass in violation of the interstate commerce law.
