THE FALL CREEK SHOOTING CASE.

It Was Purely an Accident—The Girl Will Recover?

More particulars concerning the shooting of Anna Vaughan, aged 12 years, by her 14-year-old brother at Fall Creek yesterday proved it to be another "didn't know it was loaded" accident.

Dr. C. E. Loomis, attending physician, returned from Fall Creek about 9 o'clock last evening. He gives the story about as it appeared in yesterday's GUARD, with the exception that the shooting was purely a case of accident, and was not done in a fit of passion, as reported yesterday. The children had gone to the house of their brother-in-law, Mr. Kerns, to do the chores, as stated before, and while in the house found an old pistol of antiquated origin, which had been lying around the house for ten or twelve years, and which the children did not dream was loaded. While playing with this old pistol it was in some manner discharged by the boy and the bullet entered the right side of the girl's head just above the ear. As soon as the boy realized what had happened he fled the girl, although she was almost as large as he, and carried her part way, being able with his assistance to walk part way to the house of their parents, four hundred yards distant. He shouted loudly for help and succeeded in arousing the neighbors, who came to their assistance.

When Dr. Loomis reached the home of the Vaughans, he did not find the girl in any bad condition, as he anticipated. The ball had struck the skull and, glancing, passed around the head to the opposite side, where it lodged. The exterior wall of the skull was badly torn by the ball in its passage and the interior was fractured. The doctor dressed the girl's wound, and removed the ball. He left her resting very easily, and her recovery, it was thought, to be quite favorable.

Two New Boats.—Two new boats, one under construction at 2nd street, will soon be plying on the Willamette river. They are being built by the O. R. & N. Co. and will be of the lightest draft possible. The boats will be fitted out with brand new machinery which is being made to order. One of the boats, the Gypsy, will draw but ten inches when light. Her capacity will be 80 tons, with a passenger capacity of at least 100. She will ply between Salem and Portland during the low water season and during the winter season will be placed on the route between Corvallis and Eugene, so we are informed by an agent of the company. The "Gypsy" can carry 80 tons of freight in the same depth of water that the Moline requires when light. The boats are expected to be completed soon after the first of August.

FOSTER TALKS WEATHER.

The Winter of 1895-6 Will Be a Very Hard One.

Prof. Foster discusses weather conditions in this wise:
As no writer has ever lived whose predictions have been understood alike by all who have read them, frequent explanations are necessary, in order that a fair proportion of my readers may give a right construction to my weather forecasts.

There is a brooklet chime somewhere, that by sympathetic vibrations or otherwise, incapacitates the English—I would rather say the United States language—for being understood even when written in the plainest newspaper or magazine sentences.

In my long-range forecasts of temperature and rain and drought it is not possible to be exact in all particulars, but I try to make the forecast practical. My weather tables unmistakably indicate the general characteristics of the crop and the winter seasons, but it is very difficult to determine exactly when the change from a drought to excessive rain or from long heated terms to a long low temperature will occur.

But I can, as my readers will know, give fair warning of a drought, as I did in reference to the April and May drought of this year, and of the breaking up of the drought as I did in reference to June for east of the Mississippi and a continuance of the drought well along into June for west of the Mississippi.

There is no means of knowing the future of the weather except by the records of the past weather and as these records are often very deficient our weather rules cannot always be perfect.

I have just completed my third calculation for July and following are the results:

East of the Alleghenies and north of Washington city, the temperature will be about the average and the rainfall above normal.

The Ohio valley, Tennessee and the lower lakes will average much cooler than usual, and the rainfall will be above the average.

The Southern states will have average temperature and a drought.

The southwest—Including Texas, Western Louisiana and Oklahoma—will have average temperature and rain.

The upper Mississippi valley and upper lakes, including the country north, northeast and northwest of St. Louis, will average cooler than usual and therein a deficiency of rain will occur.

In the Missouri and Red River of the North valleys temperature will average below and rainfall will be about normal.

In the west of Rockies country temperature and rainfall will be about normal.

On the South Pacific slope temperature will be above and rainfall below normal.

Within the districts mentioned above the rainfall will vary in smaller districts and I have only tried to give the general averages.

In the following forecasts of the winter the coldest and warmest periods are not considered. One half of a month may be moderately warm and the other half extremely cold in which case the month would be set down as cold, because its average would be below the normal.
