A Doctor and a Chizen Curry Each Other Down With a

The cries were issuing from the upper story of the Chrisman building, corner of Ninth and Willamette streets, and a number of startled citizens rushed in that direction. Pool carried a club in his hand, his clothing was disarranged and blood was flowing quite freely from his face and head. Pool carried in a few minutes and Pool was taken to Dr B F Hamel's office near by for medical

Constable Linton soon arrived on the scene and the officers then turned their attention to the cause of the dis-turbance. They entered the rooms of Dr L W Brown, a physician of good standing, and found signs of a strug-gle. In one corner of the room they gle. In one corner of the room they found blood upon the wall, and a pool of blood was also on the floor. A further search revealed Dr Brown stowed the ball-ways of away in a closet in the hall-ways of the building. He was immediately placed under arrest by Constable Lin-ton. Before leaving his office Dr Brown had turned out the electric

Brown had turned out the electric lights.

Upon investigation of the men's wounds it was found that Pool had quite a number of severe gashes, made evidently oy the club, about his head and face. Brown had a slight cut on his forehead, disfigured eyes and a finger that bore the appearance of having been in Pool's mouth. Neither men were much hurt, more than flesh wounds, but Pool had evidently gotten the worst of the row.

It seems that Pool has frequently been spending his evenings in social

been spending his evenings in social chat with Dr Brown in the latter's office chat with Dr Brown in the latter soffice
Last evening as usual he says he went
to Brown's office and, after passing the
time until 10 o'clock, remarked that
he would go home. Brown said he
was not busy that evening and told
Pool not to be in a hurry. He then
got up and went into his private office. Pool was sitting with his back
to the door but he heard Brown re-enter and the next instant felt a stunning blow on top of his head. Brown
struck him several more blows about
the head before he could close in upon
him. Pool was staggered by the
blows but finally grappled with Brown
and the two rolled together upon the
floor. In the scuffle Pool succeeded in
wrenching the club away from Brown wrenching the club away from Brown and escaped foom the room.

and escaped foom the room.

The strangest part of the matter is that both men tell the same story, simply reversing their positions. Brown states that Pool came to his office as usual and that they chatted pleasantly together until 10 o'clock when Pool got up and, seizing a club, struck him on the head. He then grappled with Pool and, wrenching the club away from him, struck him over the head with it. He did not see Psol bring the club into his office but did not know how else it could have gotten there.

Neither man assigns any cause for the other's attack, but both are members of the Myrtle Creek Mining and Milling Company and it is believed by many that the difficulty arose over the conduct of the business of the company. After Pool's wounds had been examined, Dr Brown was taken before the officers and placed under \$1000 bonds, with S B Eakin as surety, on the charge of assault with a dan-

gerous weapon.

The examination will not be held for a few days in order to give time to see how serious Pool's wounds will prove to be.
