Moses Guttman is teaching one of the Pleasant Hill schools and James Donaldson is teaching at Upper Leaburg. The Davis school is being taught by a young gentleman from Eugene whose name we have not learned but has been informed that he is giving satisfaction.

OUTRAGEOUS CHARGES.—Coo county, Oregon, certainly is entitled to the premium for outrageous charges, and it is no wonder she is head over heels in debt. It is a splendid section to steer clear of. A destitute resident of this county by the name of John Bouckenheimer, whose home is at Wallace, fell sick at Marshfield last fall and was sent to the McCormack hospital, which has a contract to keep the county poor at robber's prices. For 34 days keeping, including medicines, nursing, etc., Lane county is presented with a bill for \$110.50, or \$3.25 per day. This was no extraordinary case, as the officials testify that this is the price charged the county generally. In Lane county, Dr. Russell does this same identical work for \$3 per week and is glad to have the job. At Coo county charges, Lane county would pay \$45 per day, which would soon bankrupt her. The populists were elected in that county to reform matters. If they have made a start in that direction, it must have been simply terrible before they came into power.

HE WAS A HOAX.

Rich Chinaman That Wanted a White Man to Marry His Daughter.

Not long since a dispatch appeared in leading papers of the coast to the effect that a rich Chinese merchant wanted a white man to marry his daughter. He claimed to reside at San Jose, California, and since the appearance of the dispatch, Chinatown in that city has been rewarded by a horde of messenger boys with messages for Hip Sing Lee. Hip could not be found and the whole outfit is worried with answering questions concerning the mythical personage.
