Hundreds of Chinese Pheasants Shipped Alive for Breeding Purposes This Year.

Game birds are plentiful now.
Many Chinese pheasants are being sold in this city for 25 cents each. The open season for grouse, pheasant, quail, Mongolian pheasant and similar game birds in this state is from September 1 to December 1, but the birds cannot be killed for the market and offered for sale only during the period between October 15 and November 15, and dealers having birds in their posand dealers having birds in their pos-session five days after November 15 are liable to fines. In the wording of this statute, the framer was careful to be clear and specific as to the meaning of the act, and the law expressly says that it shall be unlawful to have the birds in their possession after November 15, even in cold storage. Game Protector McGuire has referred this section of the Oregon game laws to At-torney-General Idleman, to decide whether it be constitutional, and if the attorney general is of that opinion, Mr McCiuire will stop absolutely the sale of birds after the time specified by

law. Of all the game birds in Oregon none equal the Chinese pheasant. Many of them are being shipped alive, for breeding purposes, to every state in the Union. They bring, usually, \$10 a pair. Hundreds of these birds have been shipped from the Willamette valley during the present season, and the money realized from their sale amounts to a neat sum.
