FOOTBALL TALK.

Speculations as to the Outcome of the League Games. As the time draws near for the second league game the interest becomes more manifest and foot ball talk can be heard on all sides. Everyone, no matter whether college student or private citizen, is interested in the outcome of the game Saturday at Portland. This interest is increased by the fact that the two elevens who are to match their strength and prowess on the gridiron are considered the two strongest teams in the association. And the interest is further increased by the fact that the home team is to enter the contest at Portland Saturday, the result of which shall decide whether or not they shall compete for the pennant in the championship game, which will in all probability be played on Thanksgiving day. If the home team defeats Portland they will be entitled to play for the championship, but if defeated they will be out of the contests for the remainder of the season. As the matter now stands the second league game will be played in Portland next Saturday between the University of Oregon team of this city and Portland University team, the first game having already been played at Corvallis last Saturday between the Agricultural College team and Forest Grove team and resulted in a tie. The coins were tossed to see which team should play Salem, Corvallis winning. As a consequence Corvallis will play Willamette University at Salem next Saturday, at the same time the game takes place at Portland. The winners of these two games will then meet upon the gridiron at some place to be designated in a contest to see who shall play Forest Grove. According to present arrangements the winner of this last game will then have to play Forest Grove in the final championship game for the pennant, but as considerable dissatisfaction is expressed with these plans, it is quite likely that a change will be inaugurated, doing away with this last game, which if played will take place some time in the fore part of December. In this case Forest Grove will have to play the winner of Saturday's game at Salem, and the winner of that game will play the winner of the Portland game in the final contest on Thanksgiving day. Speculation is rife as to the outcome of the first game. As the U of O and Portland teams are considered the two strongest teams it is thought by many that the game at Portland Saturday will practically settle the matter. However, this is mere speculation, and the result may be entirely different. Each team will probably enter the contest with a hope of victory, but none will go with more confidence of crowning themselves with glory and finally carrying home the coveted pennant. The U of O team is in perfect working order and will put up an excellent game. It is true they were badly defeated by Portland last year, but they will put up a different game this season. The Portland team is probably in no better condition than it was last year. They have received only four days' coaching from McMillan, of the Heliance team of Oakland, California. This is all the coaching the team has had, except from home talent. One point, however, which will pull strongly in their favor is the fact that every member is an experienced player, having played in the team last year. The U of O team never was in better shape. Notwithstanding the fact that they have four new men, they will put up 100 per cent better game than they did last year. They have received six weeks of hard coaching from Benson, one of the best coaches on the coast. They have met both the Corvallis and Salem teams and in each instance came out victorious. The team played its last practice game yesterday and now awaits, in perfect trim, for the game Saturday. The lineup will be about the same as it was in the game with Corvallis. The boys have secured a special excursion car and will leave here tomorrow at 11:30 a. m., accompanied by about 50 students and citizens who go to help cheer them on to victory.
