LENT

Something About The Custom.

Daily Guard, February 15.

Lent begins today and a few words about this old-time custom may be of interest.

Lent begins on Ash-Wednesday. Ash-Wednesday, the first day of Lent, is supposed to have received this name from a custom in the church of sprinkling ashes on the heads of penitents when admitted to penance. The early church did not commence Lent until the following Sunday, but later Lent was commenced on Ash-Wednesday. Lent lasts 40 days—from Ash-Wednesday until Easter Sunday. It is the ecclesiastical season known in the Latin church, from at least the fourth century, as QUADRAGESIMA. In the ancient times no uniform observance of Lent was had, some thinking they ought to fast for one day; but later the time was gradually extended.

Regarding the manner of observing Lent, various degrees of strictness have prevailed in the church. Perfect abstinence from all food every fasting day until evening is the theory at least required, and it has also been considered desirable that public worship with sermon should be attended daily, with frequent communion, especially on Saturday and Sunday. Public amusements, especially stage plays, are prohibited, and the celebration of religious festivals, as also of birthdays and marriages, is held to be unsuitable. Increased diligence in almsgiving and deeds of charity is enjoined.

In the Roman Catholic, Greek and Episcopal churches Lent is observed. It covers the 40 days from Ash-Wednesday to Easter Eve, and is considered as a time during which certain worldly practices are to be intermitted.

Last evening the Advancement club listened to a most interesting and instructive paper from Hon H B Miller, on "The Relation of Man to Social Progress." Mr Miller prepared this paper at the special request of the club—a sequel to his address of a month ago, on "Woman's Relation to Social Progress."

The theory advanced in the concluding of the two papers is that the altruistic qualities of society are of female influence; while the aggressive and egoism of society which founds and administers all the great schemes of social progress are male influences. That woman originates the altruistic tendencies of society, and man makes possible their accomplishment. The male, from love of animal creation up to the present state of humanity, is essentially the warrior, warrior for glory, for territory, or for bread. He is the bread winner, and the same spirit of aggression which prompts this tendency also builds and equips factories, railroads and steamships, while woman's activity is essentially of a protective nature instead of aggressive. This selfish or aggressive spirit, Mr Miller thinks, is the great instrument for the bringing about of the greatest ultimate progress in society, for it makes possible, the enjoyment of all higher desires of the human race.

The address was one full of suggestions for study and contemplation, and most ingenious in its conception and arrangement. An interesting and somewhat animated discussion on the merits of the paper followed its delivery. Mr Miller's address was one of those which have been such a source of interest and instruction to the frequenters of the Advancement Club during the past winter.
