The Willamette Presbytery of the Presbyterian church for this district is now in session at the First Presbyterian church of this city. About 25 elders and ministers arrived yesterday and are in attendance upon the Presbytery, which convened at 7:30 last evening.

The session last night was taken up with an address by Rev J E Snyder, of Brownsville. The presbytery organized by electing Rev W A Smick, of Albany, Moderator and Rev S G Irvin, of Newport, temporary clerk.

The presbytery has lost one of its most valuable members in the death of Rev J C Sylvanus, of Chelalis, who died Friday last. This morning's session was taken up principally with routine work, but very little business being transacted.

Rev S J Edwards was granted a transfer to the Puget Sound presbytery. The following delegates have been sent to the Presbytery: Turner—Rev W M Robinson. Woodburn—Rev E J Thompson, D D. Newport—Rev J A Townsend, Ph D. Independence—Rev S A George. Elder J G Vanosted. Florence—Rev I G Knotts. Zena—Rev A Robinson, Elder J M Seales. Bortville—Rev J E Day. Woodburn—Rev W S Gilbert, Elder Robt Patterson. Dallas—Rev Geo H Whitman. Brownsville—Rev J E Snyder, Elder W A Templeton. Crawfordville—Elder J H Scott. Yaguna—Elder S G Irvine. Nearly all of the 25 delegates who arrived at the beginning, together with a number who have since come left for their homes on today's trains. After the GUARD went to press yesterday afternoon the presbytery set the time of its next meeting for Monday, October 5, 1896, at 7:30 p.m. in Aurora.

Mrs Prof John Bross, of Corvallis, then presented greetings of the Women's Presbyterial Missionary Society, after which the presbytery adjourned until evening. The evening session was conducted by the ladies of the W P M S, who had prepared an excellent program and entertainment.

After the GUARD went to press yesterday afternoon the presbytery set the time of its next meeting for Monday, October 5, 1896, at 7:30 p.m. in Aurora.

Mrs Prof John Bross, of Corvallis, then presented greetings of the Women's Presbyterial Missionary Society, after which the presbytery adjourned until evening. The evening session was conducted by the ladies of the W P M S, who had prepared an excellent program and entertainment.
