In the circuit court for Lane county

The grand jury hung fire yesterday in the consideration of the hobos ar re ted on the charge of sodomy, but when they reassembled this morning they again took up the case and, to the satisfaction of the public which desires to see the law enforced to the fullest extent of its power in this mat-ter, soon returned a true bill charging two of the hobos, John Foster and John Martin, with two counts. first count is the crime of sodomy and the second is assault with intent to rob. Attorney N E Markley was ap-

pointed by Judge Fullerton to defend the criminals. The defendants both entered pleas of not guilty to both charges when arraigned in circuit court. A jury trial was called at 3 o'clock and is now

in progress at the court house. The penalty for the crime of sodomy, if committed, is from 1 to 5 years in the penitentiary. 


