THE BRYAN OFFICIAL BUTTON.

The motto on the Bryan button that has been adopted is: "No Crown of Thorns; No Cross of Gold."

The idea is taken from the closing words of Bryan's speech before the Chicago convention in which he said: "Having behind us the commercial interests and the labor interests, and the toiling masses, we shall answer their demands for a gold standard by saying to them you shall not press down upon the brow of labor this crown of thorns. You shall not crucify mankind upon a cross of gold."

The exodus to the mountains continues.

The silver convention at St. Louis is practically a unit for Bryan.

The money brokers of New York shipped \$2,250,000 in gold to Europe today. It is hard to keep the "sound honest" money with us.

The free trade gold democrats are political orphans in this campaign. They might find refuge in one of the wings of the prohibition party.

The foreign tankers of New York held a meeting yesterday to confer about the best means of protecting the gold reserve. Gold deposits of nearly \$3,000,000 were made at the subtreasury as a result of the conference. They do not wish another bond issue before the presidential election. It would be fatal to McKinley on whom they stake their fortunes.

Following the lead of Senator Hill, Tammany has adopted the following resolution: "Tammany Hall hereby ratifies the nominations of the democratic national convention recently held in Chicago, viz: William J. Bryan, of Nebraska, for president, and Arthur Sewall, of Maine, for vice president. And we do hereby pledge to them our loyal, zealous and unwavering support."

O.: It may interest some people in Pendleton as well as all over the land, to know that Joaquin Miller has declared for Bryan for president and will take the platform to help along his election. It is rumored that the recent sale of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company placed that corporation in the hands of the Southern Pacific. The cessation of the fight between the railroad and steamers on low fares between Portland and San Francisco gives color to the rumor. If this is the case the steamer Gypsy will be seldom seen at Eugene. Since that boat has practically demonstrated the practicability of steamboat navigation to Eugene a considerable portion of the year, the proposition of Capt. Gray to build a boat owned by people whose interests are centered in Eugene should receive serious consideration. During periods of low water in the summer months the boat could be profitably used on the lower river. A large amount of money was saved our people in freight rates by the steamer Gypsy, and we have heard it stated the O. R. & N. netted a fair profit on their investment. Help yourselves.

THE DIVIDED POPS

The "Middle of the Road" Faction Scores a Slight Victory.

THE PROCEEDINGS.

St. Louis, Mo., July 22, 11:59 a m.—Delegates coming in slowly. Not over 75 in their seats and visitors' gallery entirely vacant.

12:40—Chairman Taubeneck calls convention to order. Senators Pfeiffer and Allen and Ignatius Donnelly, "Cyclone" Davis, General Weaver and Governor Stone occupy seats on the platform.

Chairman Taubeneck introduces Governor Stone, of Missouri, who delivers the address of welcome.

Newland, of Nevada, addresses the convention. Speech received with enthusiasm. Refers to Bryan and says: "We must accept the brilliant leader of democracy and march with him to victory."

Ignatius Donnelly is introduced and responds to Gov. Stone's address of welcome.

1:10—Senator Butler, of North Carolina, temporary chairman, was introduced and given cheers. He is now addressing the convention. Butler said the democrats had stolen the people's party platform, whereupon he was largely cheered. Said he hoped the convention would not turn into a democratic annex. He says he has too much faith to believe it will turn itself into a republican annex.

The usual committees were appointed and then the convention adjourned until 8 p. m.

St. Louis, Mo., July 23, 10:08 a m.—Weather clear and pleasant. Delegates slowly gathering. Both Bryan and anti-Bryan men claim a majority. There will probably be a test vote on credential committee reports.

10:18—Chairman Butler calls convention to order. Committee on credentials not ready to report.

10:22—Roll is being called for committee on permanent organization.

11:45—Committee on permanent organization, rules and platform have been appointed and retired.

Delegate from Oklahoma takes platform and sings a song.

G. F. Guther, of Alabama, introduces Mrs. Pennington, of Arkansas, who sang a popular song, "Down With the Others."

Committee on credentials say they will be ready to report at 5 o'clock. Motion to adjourn until that hour defeated.

12:50. Convention takes recess until 3 p. m.

Partial report of committee on credentials now being read. Credentials committee recommends in Illinois contest that both delegations be seated and each be given a half vote each. Minority report will be submitted.

In Colorado the Patterson delegation is seated.

Patterson of Colorado moves to consider contests in alphabetical order of states; motion carried.

Time of discussion of majority and minority reports limited to 15 minutes for each side for discussion.

4:35. On motion of Patterson of Colorado contests go over an hour or until minority report is presented.

Darrow, of Chicago, speaking for adoption of the minority report seating the Taylor delegation. Time of discussion extended 30 minutes.

Jerry Simpson, of Kansas, making five minute speech favoring minority report. Received with cheers.

Col. S. F. Morton, of Chicago, advocating adoption of majority report.

5:00—Secretary ordered to call roll of states on motion substituting minority report seating Taylor delegation from Cook county.

5:34—The motion substituting minority report for majority report lost by a vote of 665 to 612.

Majority report adopted seating both factions of Illinois with one-half vote for each delegate.

This is considered a victory for the middle-of-the-road men.

Report of credentials committee adopted.

Colorado minority report withdrawn.

6:07—During contest Geo. F. Washburn, of Massachusetts has been acting as temporary chairman.

Convention still in session as we go to press.

The Latest.

On a test vote for Chairman Senator Alley, a Bryan man, was elected chairman over Champion, a middle-of-the-road man, by 200 majority. This surely indicates that Bryan will be endorsed or nominated for president.

THE SILVERITES.

All Are in Favor of Bryan and Sewall.

PROCEEDINGS THIS FAR.

St. Louis, July 22, 12:10.—It is the plan of the silverites to perfect a temporary organization and appoint a committee before the afternoon adjournment. A committee of seven will be sent to confer with the populists.

12:16—Convention called to order by Chairman Mott of the national committee.

Roll of committee on credentials being called.

1:45—A young lady costumed as the Goddess of Liberty is reading the declaration of independence.

Chairman of the convention read a telegram from Senator Teller, of Colorado, saying that a vote for Bryan and Sewall is a vote for the monetary independence of America. Great cheering.

Convention adjourned until 4:30 though much opposition to adjournment was manifest.

SECOND SESSION.

Afternoon session called to order by temporary chairman Newlands.

Motion to admit populists to the hall without tickets, carried.

6 p m—Committee on rules reported; report of credentials committee approved.

Committee on permanent organization reported W. P. St. John, of New York, for permanent chairman. Great applause. Chairman St. John escorted to the chair. He is now addressing the convention.

5:12—Chairman interrupted by loud and continued cheering. Frequent bursts of applause and cheering.

5:28—Chairman St. John concludes amid loud and enthusiastic applause.

6:37—Much discussion and excitement over motion to appoint a committee to confer with populists. Chairman rapping for order.

Argument over conference committee continues; several substitutes and amendments offered; great confusion.

Motion to appoint a conference committee, carried.

[Convention still in session when we went to press at 5 o'clock.]

St. Louis, Mo., July 23, 10:18 a m.—Delegates late in arriving. Committee selected for conference with people's party caucusing back of chairman's desk. The hall is filling rapidly.

10:32—Convention called to order.

10:35—Motion to appoint a committee on ways and means carried.

10:50—Congressman Chas. Towne, of Minnesota, addressing the convention.

Towne says Wm J. Bryan represents the cause of humanity against injustice. At the mention of Teller's name the convention cheers in a body.

11:42—Ex-Governor St. John, of Kansas, called for and responds. Mention of Cleveland's name greeted with laughter.

Mrs. Congar, of Indiana, addresses the convention.

Band plays, "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

Convention rises and sings.

Sheldon, of Connecticut, addresses convention.

Towne, of Minnesota, says Mrs. Ellen Lease, of Kansas, will address the convention this evening.

Hon. R. A. Cole, of Wisconsin, addresses the convention, and takes issue with Mrs. Congar's address. Defends the brewing interests of Milwaukee and St. Louis. Cole interrupted. Chair raps for order and says the speaker must be heard. Great confusion. Cole resumes and concludes his speech.

12:50—Recess taken until 2:30 p. m. Lane's speech well received.

Motion made by chairman that when the convention adjourns the hour for reconvening be set at 10:30 tomorrow morning caused a general and heated argument.

4:40—Motion that upon adjournment the hour for reconvening be set for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, carried.

A poll of the former political affiliations of the delegates to this convention gives the following result: Republicans 529; democrats 135; populists 47; prohibitionists 9; greenbackers 1; independents 13; total 731.

Convention adjourned until 10 a m tomorrow.

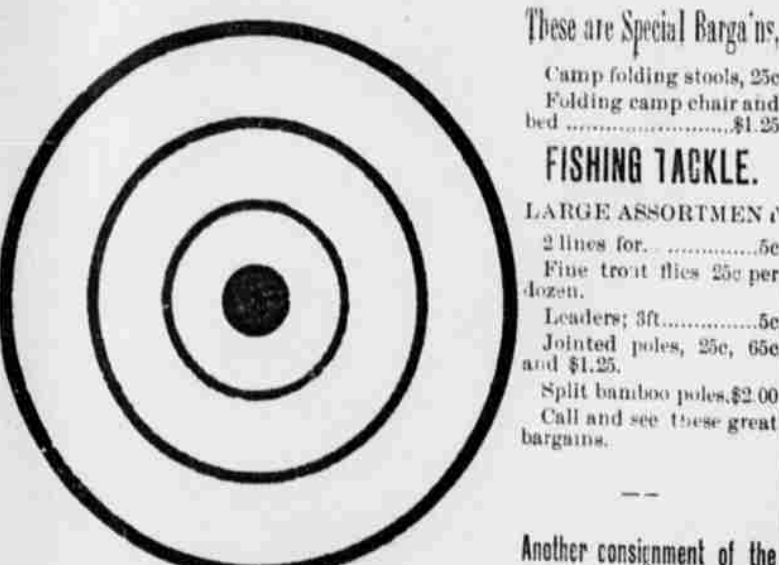
