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The McKinley Gambling Case.

Tuesday's Portland Telegram: "The examination of H McKinley on the charge of gambling was commenced in Justice McDevitt's court this morning but had not proceeded far when Attorney John F. Logan, representing the defendant, called a halt in the proceedings through some new propositions of law. He objected to the introduction as evidence of the complaint, in which McKinley seeks to recover double the amount of his loss from Frank Hellen, in the latter's gambling house. In this complaint McKinley avers that he lost the money in gambling. The state by introducing this document in evidence endeavored to establish the defendant's guilt by his own sworn confession. Attorney Logan objected to the introduction of this paper on the ground that it did not allege a crime, and consequently could not be used as evidence in a criminal proceeding. He contended that it alleged only the loss of money on the part of McKinley, and the maintenance of a gambling house on the part of Hellen, who was not on trial.

"Mr Logan also took exception to the law under which the prosecution is brought, that the case at issue did not come within its province. He contended that under this law only the owners and employees of gambling houses could be prosecuted. Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald took issue with the counsel for the defense on the construction of the law, and presented the construction that has been obtained in the courts of this state in prosecutions of a similar nature for years past. For the purpose of satisfying himself on the hair splitting points, the court took the objections raised under advisement until tomorrow. A motion for a dismissal of the action will be in order if the decision on the latter point of law is raised in favor of the defense. If not the examination will be continued and the case tried on its merits."

Started The Wheels.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Nov. 24.—The Noonday Mining Company started the wheels of their 20-stamp mill turning today. The Hammond Manufacturing Company began putting up the mill several months ago, and has just finished. The mill is of as modern design as any on the Pacific coast, having all the necessary improvements for handling different kinds of ores. By the tramway running from the mine to the mill, a distance of 2800 feet, ore is conveyed in large buckets, of which there are 24. There is also a telephone line connecting the mill and mine. A large amount of ore has already been taken out, and the mill will be kept running all winter. The Champion mill was shut down yesterday, on account of not having sufficient ore to keep the mill running. The company will keep a crew of men working in the tunnels and doing development work this winter, and will start the mill again early in the spring.
