38 Members Present Today—Hunting-
ton Withdraws.
Routine Work in Senate.
 Special to the GUARD.
 SALEM, Feb. 4, 3 p. m.—The usual
 large crowd filled the joint convention
 hall today, eager to witness the pro-
 ceedings. While some claimed that
 the badly needed "40" would be pres-
 ent, the great majority had no such
 idea. Some of the supporters of Sen-
 ator Mitchell say they will support him
 as long as the legislature continues,
 and will make no compromise what-
 ever with the opposition. Still some
 of his friends think that the legislature
 will yet organize and pass some need-
 ed legislation even if a senator is not
 elected.
 The joint convention assembled
 shortly after noon, thirty-nine being
 present.
 However shortly after, Representa-
 tive B. S. Huntington, of Wasco county
 withdrew. He made an explanation,
 declaring the action of the Ben-
 son house and joint convention un-
 constitutional.
 Adjourned until tomorrow.

 the senate.
