Death of an Old Resident.

The following account of the death

of Mrs Harris is taken from the Napa

Daily Register, of February 29, pub-

lished at Napa City, California. In an

early day Mrs Harris resided near

Harrisburg in Lincoln county:

"Mrs Harris, an old and respected

resident of Napa valley, died at 12

o'clock m. today at the residence of her

son, W C Harris, corner of Main street

and Lincoln avenue. Mrs Harris had

been living with her daughter, Mrs

Steeter of Rutherford, but came to

Napa for a visit six weeks ago. She

was sick only about two weeks. De-

ceased was born in Estill county, Ken-

tucky, in 1810, on May 24th, 1829,

was married to P F Harris. In 1831

Mr and Mrs Harris moved to Missouri

and in 1853 they crossed the plains to

California and settled in Napa valley.

P F Harris, husband of deceased, died

in 1872. Four children, 3 sons and 1

daughter, mourn a mother's loss. [W

C Harris of Napa, Mrs Steeter, and

H H Harris of Rutherford, and J B

Harris of Eugene, Oregon.] Deceased

was a member of the Christian

church. The funeral will be held from

the Baptist church in Yountville Mon-

day afternoon at 1 o'clock."
