CASCADE TIMBER RESERVE.

The people of Lane county do not fully appreciate the injustice which has been done them by withdrawing lands in the Cascade mountains from use and settlement.

In round numbers Lane county has 4500 square miles of territory. Of this about 1700 square miles on the east have been withdrawn from public use and settlement.

We are aware that much of this land can never be settled. But there are many locations along the streams where homes may be carved out, and billions of feet of fine timber that should eventually be brought into the market and that too without injuring our timber growth.

The lumbering that would naturally be done in this reserve during the next century could have little effect on the volume of timber, taking new growth into consideration.

The rifling of the tomb of the dead millionaire, W S Ladd, calls attention to the futility of modern methods of embalming. The corpse is left a horrible gruesome reminder of the vanity of worldly affairs.
