Personal Friendship for Mr. Miller Takes Bryan to That Town.

Lebanon Will Entertain Visitors. EDITOR GUARD: I notice an article in the DAILY GUARD of May 24, relative to W J Bryan's visit to Lebanon, and I think you do Lebanon a great injustice by saying "the appointment should have been Albany or Eugene instead of an out of the way place like Lebanon." Certainly Mr Editor, you were not conversant with the facts, or you would not have made the above statement. Mr Bryan's appointment was made at Lebanon without the intervention of any committee whatever, but was secured through the personal efforts of Hon M A Miller himself.

Mr Bryan wrote Mr Miller a personal letter to the effect that he had intended to go through from Ash land to Portland without stopping at any intermediate points, but inasmuch as he had personally promised Mr Miller that if he ever came to Oregon, he would make Lebanon a visit, therefore he would spend Sunday here and speak to the people on the following Monday. Now these are the facts in the case. You can readily see that it was through Mr Miller's efforts, unaided by any one, that Mr Bryan was prevailed upon to speak in this part of Oregon, and had it not been for the personal friendship that exists between Miller and Bryan the people in this section would not have been permitted to hear the great orator without going to Portland or Oregon City.

In view of the above facts I think the newspapers and public generally, should do everything in their power to make the meeting a success. Destroyed by Fire.

On Friday, May 21, about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon the old house on the Phillip Mulkey place southwest of town was destroyed by fire. The house had been occupied by the family of Thomas Gill, but all were away from home but Mrs John Daere, Mrs Gill's mother, who is quite aged and feeble. A young son of Mr Peterson, who lives near, noticed the flames and went over and with the help of young Joel Gill, who shortly returned from a berry picking trip, saved a few chairs, some bedding, etc., all the other household furniture, as well as the structure being destroyed. Mr Gill is away teaching school and Mrs Gill was in Eugene at the time and was not apprised of her loss until her arrival home in the evening. The fire caught from a defect of a stovepipe joining the flue in the kitchen.

This was said to be the oldest house in the county, since the one built by Elijah Bristow at Pleasant Hill was destroyed, and was an honored pioneer landmark. No insurance was carried on the building or contents.

ESCAPMENT.

Tuesday, June 29 and for Six Days Following.

Adjutant General Tuttle yesterday issued general order No 19, giving instructions in detail governing the state encampment of the Oregon National Guard, as it is officially termed "a camp of instruction," at or near Hood River, for a period of six days, beginning June 29. The brigade commander is directed to assemble the following named organizations: Second Regiment and detachment of the hospital corps. Third battalion and detachment of the hospital corps. Companies B and F First Regiment, Battery A. Troop B. Engineer Corps. Signal Corps. Recruits enlisted subsequent to June 15, 1897, will remain at their stations, but this does not apply to reenlistments.

Per diem of \$1 per day will be allowed for each officers horse. The quartermaster general will furnish transportation for the troops, horses and material, provide tentage and equipment. The commissary general will provide rations and subsistence. The surgeon general will have charge of sanitary affairs and care of sick and wounded. Target practice will be had during the encampment. Not to exceed \$200 in expense for the construction of booths and ranges will be allowed. No expense will be incurred not authorized by this order, except upon the proper requisition directed from the office of the adjutant general.

"The strictest economy is enjoined upon all the departments to the end that the expense incident to the encampment may be reduced to actual necessity." By order of the Commander-in-Chief, B B TUTTLE, Adjutant-General.
