In Favor of the Women-An Appeal Will be Taken to the Supreme Court.

Readers of the GUARD will rememher that a number of ladies tried to vote for school director at the annual school election of the Eugene school district but were refused that privilegs by the judges of election. A suit was brought to test the right of the F I, Chambers, women to cast their ballots, and have them counted, attorney Geo B Dorris appearing for the plaintiff and ER Skipworth for defendant,

The case was submitted on d-murrer. on briefs, without oral argument, to Judge Fullerton, and his opinion on the demurrer was filed w th the county clerk today in favor of the plaintiff. As the merits of the case were argued on the demurrer this sottles the case, so far as this opinion of the court is concerned, in favor of the right of women taxpayers to vote for officers of a school district.

We are informed the case will be appealed to the supreme court f r flual determination. The question is an important one and its settlement will remove much of the ill feeling that is too often the result of closely contested school elections where both sides are generally too auxious to secure advantage of the vote of the women.
