That Chinook is an expressive language. We are sorry it is fast passing away, only a few of the old pioneers conversant with its merits being left. The two or three hundred words, of which it is composed, at one time were the only means of communication between scattering whites and the numerous tribes of Indians that roamed over the vast country west of the Rocky mountains and north of the California line.

It not only was the means of communication between the whites and Indians, but between the living but a few bundred miles ry. apart could make themselves understood only by use of signs.

As an instance the Calapooias that were native to and inhabited the southern part of Lane county and south through Douglas county could hardly converse and make themselves understood, by use of their native tongue, with the Molallas that occupied the northern portion of the valley.

For the benefit of the uninformed we may state the Chinook was the creation of Hudson Bay Company employes, the words generally, though, being of Indian origin and derivation.

adopted: "We demand the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1. independent of the action of any other nation; that the government shall issue ail money without the intervenion of banks, and in quantity adequate for the needs of the people; that whether gold, silver or paper, shall be legal tender for all debts, public or private: that no contract or law shall discriminate against any kind of money issued by the government. We are opposed to the iss e of United States interest bearing bonds in time of peace.

"We demand the redemption of Oregon from rings, commissions and orrupt methods, and demand honest elections and election laws. We demand that the people shall have the veto power over all legislative enact. ments by the use of the referendum. We demand the election of all officers by the direct vote of the people. We favor and advise that all nominations to municipal and county officers. including members of the legislature,

"We recommend that this party shall be known as the union party. and invite all reformers of the state to literary program in the morning, and unite with us in localizing these prin cipales by united effort, and we pledge ourselves to unite with reform forces. in carrying out this bond of union."
