THE ASSESSMENT DON'T SHOW IT.

The Guard says that Doctor Chapman, though receiving a salary of \$3,000, only gave in enough property to pay 44 cents taxes, this on Dr Chapman's sworn statement that he did not have one dollar of money, notes or accounts on hand.

We gave the figures of the assessment roll of Lane county. That roll, last year, showed that Doctor Chapman paid a state, county, city and school tax of 44 cents, and owned no town lots, land or farm property in Lane county.

Perhaps Doctor Chapman will make a better showing this year. From that small sum of \$3,000 he ought to be able to give the assessors a little encouragement.

Silver is now quoted at 60 cents an ounce with the mints of Japan and Peru closed against it. It is not now a 50-cent but a 40-cent dollar and the gold dollar measured by the value of real estate, produce and human labor is worth 220 cents. The scales are rapidly falling from the eyes of many of the blinded followers of the single gold standard and they are beginning to realize that they have been duped. It has been an anxiety of human progress that when barbarous or semi-barbarous nations adopted a certain course of action civilized nations dropped it and took another step forward. It would seem by this rule that the time has come to drop the gold standard and take a step forward by the adoption of a bimetallic standard of monetary value.

Occasionally the daily press is equal to the emergency and fearlessly attacks, wronging and deception. A late issue of the Pendleton Tribune is an example. The editor, no doubt, had been deceived by the attractive strawberry box, and seeks to call public attention to the source of his woe by pertinent remarks. It suggests that "while the Hood River people have been doing a great deal of talking about their big yield of strawberries this season they have not touched upon the important subject as to whether the bottoms of the boxes are to be any further from the top than usual."

The Roseburg Review says there is a certain young man there who is very much disgusted. The young man says that last summer he received a dollar a day for labor, but his employer told him the fifty-three cent dollar Bryan story, and got him to vote for McKinley. Now, instead of getting even fifty-three cents per day, he is getting just even fifty. McKinley split the wages and gives fifty cents on the dollar.

The S P Co has inaugurated a plan to defeat the residents of the interior who wish to take advantage of the reduced through rate from Portland to San Francisco by requiring the passenger to pay double the amount of fare and giving a rebate check good at the other end, people desiring to take the flyer at intermediate points have found no way of beating this combination yet; but it is safe to say they will ultimately.

Since 1892 the number of cattle in the United States has fallen off fourteen per cent, hogs eighteen per cent, and sheep 20 per cent, and there has been a heavy falling off in the number of horses. At the same time population has greatly increased. This means better prices in the near future for all these products.

On Monday, July 12, Hon Wm J Bryan of Nebraska will speak at the Oregon City Chautauqua assembly on bimetalism. Excursion trains will be run all day to and from Oregon City and no other speaker will fill the big building as full as it will be when Mr Bryan speaks there.

FRUIT PROSPECTS.—In conversation today with D W Coolidge, one of the best posted and most successful fruit men in the county, a reporter learned that on the Coolidge ranch south of town on the hills, grapes are looked for a large crop; Italian prunes, Bartlett pears and peaches ditto. French prunes from a half to a full crop, and that so far as his orchard indicates, a full crop of cherries, although in other orchards this crop will be small. Lane county has not yet reached her fruit epoch, but when she does it will mean thousands of dollars distributed to where we do not now have cents distributed.

THE CATTLE CENTER.—Corvallis Times: From Eugene alone there will be nine train loads of cattle shipped west this season. A train comprises from 18 to 20 cars. Besides this, there will be a train of 2,300 head driven from Eugene to Wyoming. When it is taken into consideration that every animal is a one or two-year-old it is almost a marvel where they came from. This year the Willamette valley alone will send 15,000 head to eastern states. The diligence with which stockmen are scouring the country in search of cattle for shipment gives rise to the fear that there will not be any left for seed.

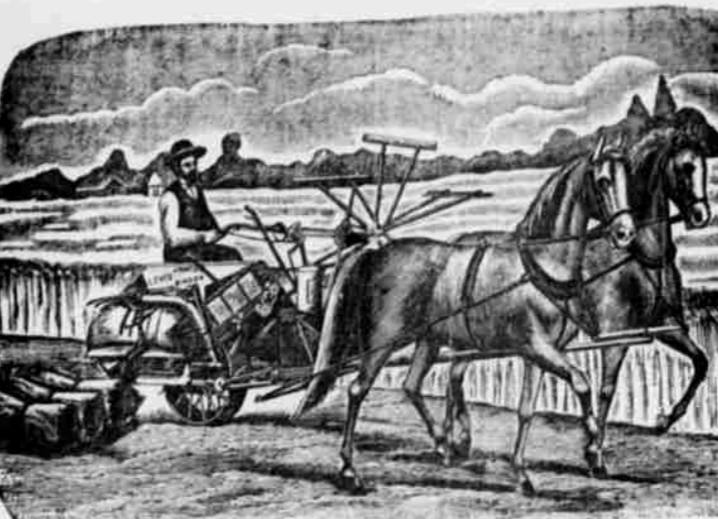
