An Interesting Letter About the Western Portion of Lane.

TRIP TO FLORENCE.

Having heard the "low pass" road favorably mentioned I decided to try this route with a bicycle. From Eugene the road leads past Irving, through Fern Ridge, Smithfield, Franklin, past Goldson's mill, Blach. ley, Triangle lake, the falls of Lake passage about one shilling dearer. Creek, thence down this stream and Siuslaw to steamboat navigation at Seaton. The road from Eugene to Smithfield, some fourteen miles, is level and smooth, making a delightful run in the face of the northwest breeze, At Smithfield the road leaves the prairie, crossing the Long Tom, and with a very common grade ascends the coast range over this low pass. The sympathy with other markets of the grades are uniformly even, easy and wide, making it a safe and pleasant road to travel.

In the Lake Creek valley around Blachley are many very flue farms of rich land. Triangle lake is a splendid sheet of water covering about one section of land. It is fed by numerous mountain brooks, full of trout. Around the shores of the lake are ideal camping places in the shade and shelter of the evergreen forest.
