SILVER AND ITS MONEY VALUE.

"A money metal is a commodity like any other article of exchange and its value is simply a commodity value. That is its value, like the value of all other articles of commerce, is determined by the relation of supply and demand."

It was Jack Falstaff who said: "Lord, lord! how we old men are given to lying." The editor of the Oregonian well knows that the present depreciable value of silver is directly attributed to the demonization of silver, and discrimination against it by the principal commercial nations of the world.

It is almost like depriving him (the conductor) of the right to earn a living by the pursuit of an honorable calling, a right inherent, of which he cannot be deprived by any rule, regulation or practice of employers of men.

The same appreciation in value follows the scarcity of any article used in the commerce of the world. Let the wheat crop fail, thus producing a scarcity, and the price rises like a thermometer in hot weather.

A SENSIBLE DECISION.

The decision of the Oregon supreme court that the Secretary of State shall draw warrants for salaries, the compensations for which are provided for by law or by the constitution is sensible and reasonable. Heretofore it has been the rule for the Secretary of State to draw warrants only for expenditures provided for by the biennial legislative appropriation bill.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

An opinion of vital importance to railroads and other corporations and employes generally has just been filed by the Appellate Court at Mt Vernon, Illinois.

The spit was brought by a former freight conductor of the road to recover \$2,000 on a declaration charging that, although the plaintiff had been a faithful employe of the railroad company for ten years, he was discharged without cause, and that the customary letter or clearance card, showing time of service and general capacity, was refused.

It is alleged that the defendant road and other railroads have a custom, which is charged to be a conspiracy, not to employ a discharged employe of a road without such letter or clearance card.
