DIVINITY SCHOOL Dedication Services Very Impressive.

A MAGNIFICENT STRUCTURE Wm F Cowden of Tacoma Delivers an Eloquent Address.

Other Exercises in Detail. Daily Guard November 1. The Eugene Divinity school building, now formally dedicated in the exercises of yesterday, will be placed in active use.

The exercises of the afternoon begun at 2:30 with a voluntary by the organist, Miss Pearl Lakin. The audience led by the Divinity school choir sang "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

Dean Sanderson introduced to the assembly, Rev Wm F Cowden, superintendent of Missions for the Pacific Northwest, who spoke eloquently and at some length on the origin of the Eugene Divinity school, paying some beautiful tributes to the success of Dean Sanderson and his co-workers.

He emphasized the need of an educated ministry and said the time had forever passed that the preacher with some personal magnetism and a few bible truths, and who was able to make an exhortation was a successful minister.

The preacher of today must present the claims of the bible in such a manner as to appeal to the reason of men if he would have them accept it, and it is for this purpose, to equip the young men of this state that this institution is intended and you will find that in time it will cause bible knowledge to be so multiplied that the people of this city will be better acquainted with the bible than the theologians of the past ages were and you are to be complimented upon its establishment here.

Bishop Mills was then introduced as a friend to the institution and spoke warmly of the success of Dean Sanderson, especially of the success of Dean Sanderson on occasion upon which all Christians should rejoice, for the members of Christ's body are so closely connected that if one member suffers, all members suffer with it, and if one member rejoices all members rejoice with it.

Dr Chapman then spoke concerning the connection or the attitude of the U of O toward the Divinity school. He said he had watched with deep interest the progress of the school and was glad it was located here.

Dean Sanderson then spoke of the work and workers, mentioning especially the name of Judge Cowls, deceased, of McMinnville, and his wife, who gave \$1400 toward the erection of the building.

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FRANCHISE GRANTED. The Council Passes the New Electric Light Franchise.

The common council met last evening at the call of the mayor. Present Mayor Kuykendall and Councilmen Day, Gray, Fisher, Horn and Luckey.

To provide for additional electric facilities in the city of Eugene, and authorizing the erection and construction of lines of poles and all other apparatus for the operation and maintenance thereof.

SECTION 1.—That authority be and is hereby granted by the common council of the city of Eugene to Edwin M Force and associates, their successors and assigns, for the period of fifty (50) years, to erect, construct, equip, furnish, maintain and operate within the corporate limits of the city of Eugene, in the state of Oregon, and in all plats and additions that are or may be at any time hereafter added thereto, a modern electric system.

SECTION 2.—That the said parties mentioned in section one are authorized to erect poles and run wires in, over, through or under the avenues, streets, alleys, parks and public places of the city.

SECTION 3.—That the places in which it is proposed to erect poles shall be submitted to the street committee of the common council for approval of location, and no poles shall be erected without such approval.

SECTION 4.—That all the poles and line work shall be set and work done as near as is practicable in accordance with the rules of the Board of Electrical Insurance Exchange, provided that it will not tend to increase the fire risk or rates of insurance.

SECTION 5.—That where the mains of the multiple lighting system cross each other at junctions of avenues, streets or alleys that they shall, at that point, be provided with switches or cut-out boxes, so that the current can be cut out in case of fire from that section of the city.

SECTION 6.—That the city shall have the right under the supervision of the mayor or electrician of the party of section one, to run wires upon the poles and structures erected under this franchise, for the purpose of establishing and operating a City Fire Alarm or Police Telegraph System.

Salem Journal of Saturday: Miss Rosalie Friendly, of Eugene, is a guest of the Misses Paine at the asylum for a few days.

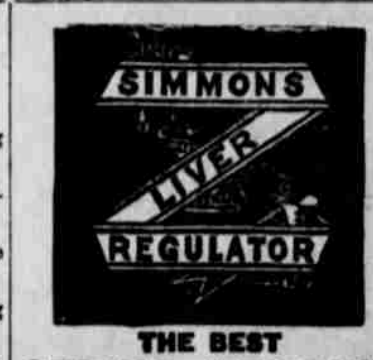
Miss Edythe Hoffman leaves on tonight's overland train for San Francisco, where she will visit two or three months.
