LOS ANGELES, Jan 29.

Yesterday was the Golden Jubilee, it being the fiftieth year since the first discovery of gold in California. At 2 o'clock the procession started on the march. It looked as if the whole country had turned out to make a display. They had a big train of dozes and donkeys loaded down for Klondike.

Everything is looking lovely here. We will be home pretty soon.

**Republican Editors.**

PORTLAND, Or, Jan 31.—At the annual meeting of the republican editorial press association today the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: D M C Gault of Hillsboro, president; W J Clarke, Gervais, secretary; H S Train, Albany, treasurer; executive committee, J B Eddy, J R Beagle and J T Lightner.

More than 50 business men and taxpayers of Sumpter, desiring proper police, fire and sanitary protection, have petitioned the Baker county court to grant the city the right to call an election to vote on incorporation and election of officers to be called as speedily as possible. The petition states the population of Sumpter is not less than 900, and designates the place or parcel of land to be set off for the city to be one mile long and three-fourths of a mile wide.

**HAS NOT FORGOTTEN.**

Oregon City Enterprise: "The Eugene GUARD says 'Senator McBride misrepresents Oregon in voting for the gold standard.' The editor of the GUARD forgotten so soon that the people of Oregon said, only a little over a year ago, by a majority of over two thousand votes they were in favor of the gold standard for the United States until such time as international agreement can be brought about? That was the clear cut issue in Oregon in that last national campaign, with fusion absolute and complete with the populists and democrats on one side and the republicans on the other. Does the GUARD remember what the majority said upon the question? Senator McBride is truly a representative of the state and its interests are being well looked after."

The GUARD has not "forgotten" the result of the election a little over a year ago. Neither has it forgotten that the union of forces then made was of hasty creation and necessarily imperfect. That many voters did not thoroughly understand the issues involved and allowed themselves to be influenced and led away by sycophantic arguments addressed to their prejudices, or by pledges made only to be disregarded after the election.

A notable illustration thereof is the plank in the McKinley platform pledging his party to secure international bimetalism. It was a fraud upon its face and the pledge was made without the least intention of honorably endeavoring to fulfill it in case of a successful issue and with the belief that such an international agreement was without the range of possibility. The truth of this statement has been thoroughly demonstrated by every move made by the dominant party.

The bunko man never practiced a cooler deception on a victim than did the Republican party with its "international bimetalism" fake.

**"SOUND SENSE AND CALM JUDGMENT" NEEDED.**

W T Rigdon, Silver Republican, in a communication to the Salem Journal says:

"It is to be hoped that outside influence and officious intermeddling will be counteracted by an application of sound sense and calm judgment, that the motives for discord and dis-union will be well understood and all such efforts dealt with accordingly.

"The 'dear blessed Populists' will be warned against the 'wily, avicious Democrats' on the one side and the 'sturdy, honest old bedrockers' will be taunted for making love to the 'hairbrained hayseeders' on the other side. But an eye single to honesty, economy and good judgment will see in all such effort a death struggle to retain a long abused lease of 'power.'"

According to General Lee's latest report from Havana to the state department no less than 200,000 people on the island are in the last stages of destitution and are wholly dependent upon charity. To feed these a couple on a ten-cent rate per day would cost \$20,000 daily, which sum is double the amount so far received in contributions.

**THE INDIANAPOLIS BANKERS CONVENTION.**

The gist of the proceedings of the Indianapolis Bankers convention, which declared for the gold standard without reservation, is found in the following resolutions:

"4th—To provide paper currency, convertible into gold, and equal to it in value in all times and places, in which the volume is made equal to the necessary needs of business, and there shall be a combined quality of growth and elasticity through which it will adjust itself automatically and promptly to all variations of demand, whether sudden or gradual, and which shall distribute itself through the country as the want of the different sections may require.

"5th—To utilize existing silver dollars so as to maintain their parity with gold without imposing undue burdens upon the treasury.

"6th—To avoid the issue of interest-bearing bonds except in case of unlooked for emergency; but to confer power to issue bonds when necessary for the preservation of the credit of the government."

The reader will note that gold is made the basis for all financial transactions, and that silver is merely "utilized" so far as existing coinage is concerned. Also that power is ask to issue interest bearing bonds at the judgment of the secretary of treasury.

This is the administration financial program, as outlined by Secretary Gage, with the addition that it would retire greenbacks by issuance of interest bearing gold bonds.

It remains to be seen what the intelligent voters of Oregon will say next June to this superb scheme of the money loaners and bond holding class. At that time this state will elect two congressmen, and a legislature to elect a senator, who will have votes on financial legislation. The question at issue is very simple. Will the laboring men, mechanics, and farmers vote to contract our money supply thus rendering it more valuable, and everything it buys, labor and its products, of less value? The issue is plain.

**UREN'S RESIGNATION.**

Portland Tribune.

"Mr W S U'Ren, in resigning as chairman of the populist central committee of Clackamas county, declares that he does so because he is opposed to fusion between the populists and Bryan democrats. This reason may be the true one, but it might have been expected that the recent exposures of his venal course during the legislative session at Salem last winter would have furnished a sufficient reason to a man of sensibility to resign from any public position and to withdraw to private life.

"His correspondence, as recently published exclusively in The Tribune, and his confessions when he returned from Salem, that he had received a portion of the Corbett money, indicate his moral fiber, however, and one explanation from him is as good as another. Truth does not flow from so foul a source."
