**DROWNED NEAR JUNCTION.**

Wm. Spangh Lost His Life in the Willamette.

Special to the Star.—

JUNCTION CITY, Feb. 15.—Wm Spangh while at work on the Willamette river, east of Junction, about half a mile below the Johnson landing, lost his life at one o'clock today through drowning.

Mr Spangh was running fence posts on the river and his boat was carried under a drift by the current. He was about 50 years of age. The body has not yet been recovered.

**A DISGRACEFUL ROW.**

The Participants Routed Up and Heavily Fined.

At about 2:30 o'clock this morning Policeman Croner heard a great noise in the house of ill fame, located on the corner of Seventh and Oak streets. He ran to the scene at once and could hear one Ashley Stevens, who lodges therein, beating Eva Gray, one of the occupants. Besides all the occupants were using the most profane language imaginable. He rang the door bell and all was quiet in an instant, and the occupants would not admit him. Later he was let in, however, and he placed the three women, Eva Gray, Nettie Gray and Francis Gray, on a charge of disorderly conduct, to appear before the Recorder at 2 p. m. Then he proceeded to lock up Stevens in the city jail despite his ravings and protestations.

This forenoon he was brought before Recorder Dorris on a warrant charging him with disorderly conduct and was fined \$20 and costs, but having neither gold or silver money to liquidate the same he was locked up in the city bastle, where he will board for ten days at the city's expense.

This afternoon Marshal Stiles arrested the women, Eva Gray, Nettie Gray and Francis Gray, on a charge of wilfully and unlawfully keeping and maintaining a bawdy house in Eugene, Oregon. They entered a plea of guilty to the charge, Recorder Dorris fining each of them \$50 and costs, the lowest penalty, and ordered them committed until they paid the same. On account of the financial depression they concluded to serve the sentence out in the city jail and were locked up.

From all accounts Stevens was the cause of the disgraceful row, and when he serves out his fine he should be warned to leave the city, and if he fails to do so, should be vagged and given a good long sentence. The man who lives off the earnings of such women is a hundred-fold worse than his consorts.

**HOPS CONTRACTED.**

Today's Salem Statesman: T B Walker and S W Jones, of this county, have entered into a contract to furnish to Thompson & Co. of New York, 10,000 pounds of their hop crop to be raised during the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901. The consideration is to be ten cents per pound, including an advance of 4 cents for use during picking season.

**PATENT FILED.**

The O & C Railroad Company has filed in the clerk's office for record land patent No 93, primary list, granted by the government, since the advent of President McKinley into office. It covers about 3500 acres of land. The patent has already been recorded in Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties.

**A VERY SWEEPING OPINION.**

Judge Burnett's Old Ruling is Reversed.

Monday's Salem Journal: "The suit of Laura A Harris vs Sherwood Barr et al, appeal from Lane, opinion by Wolverton, J, was affirmed by the supreme court today.

"The sole question presented in this suit is whether women are entitled to vote at a meeting for election of a school director of the district in which the meeting is held. Plaintiff was awarded damages by Judge Fullerton for having been denied the privilege of voting. Appeal was taken and now the supreme court upholds the lower court, and women entitled to vote under the law of 1891 can collect damages if refused the right.

"The law upheld defines the rights of voters at school meetings as follows: Twenty-one years of age, resident of the district one month preceding election, and who has paid a tax other than road tax in the county; women who are widows and have taxable property in the district may vote if they choose.

"The decision is a sweeping one and completely overrules the opinion held by Judge Burnett at Salem, under which women have been shut out of school elections.

"The only question now seems to be the property qualifications of judges of election, as any woman qualified to vote who is refused the right may sustain a suit for damages against the judges of the election.

"The news was telegraphed to Eugene and there will be a celebration by the ladies of that city. The result will be gratifying to those at Salem who have contended for the right of women to vote at school elections."

**TO BE MARRIED.**

Miss Ida Evenson, who left here on this morning's early train for Iowa, will meet Mr George Bolton at St Paul, Minn, and be married to him at the residence of the groom's uncle in that city, where they will permanently reside. Mr Bolton is a prominent merchant at that place. The couple have been acquainted since childhood. Miss Evenson's friends will one and all send hearty congratulations to her, as she was quite popular in Eugene society.

**FIRE AT MARSHFIELD.**

A bad fire occurred in Marshfield Sunday night which caused a loss of \$7000. The building of H Segstacken was badly damaged by fire and there will be a heavy loss on the stock of drugs and groceries by the deluge of water. Others who were burned out were: Dr Tower physician, Coast Mail printing office, W U Douglas' office, and O E Smith, dentist.

**QUIT A CREW.**

The Postal Telegraph Co's crew of eleven men invaded the city today and placed in position the extra wire. They string about seven miles of wire per day.

**INTEREST IN 1861.**

A 25 Per Cent Rate During "War Times"—Probably "Greenbacks."

In looking over a 1861 issue of the Eugene Weekly Review, a professor of the GRAB, in this newspaper field, we find an advertisement that indicates that a borrower took advantage of the legal tender quality of the greenback, then worth about 60 cents on the dollar. The 25 per cent interest rate was common in those days. To the credit of our people it was but seldom the borrower of gold took advantage of the situation and paid his debt in greenbacks. It was a matter of honor with the people to pay in the kind of money they had borrowed. The following is the advertisement referred to:

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO** whom it may concern, that I have this day deposited with H. Small, County Clerk of Lane county, Oregon, the sum of \$1,500.00 for the payment of two certain promissory notes given by R. H. Hazleton and Robert Calley to Campbell, the other in September, 1861—bearing 25 per cent. interest, amounting to the sum of \$1,625, as computed by the said Christian on the 21st day of August, 1863.
