Lane County Peoples Party Convention.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., March 2 1898. TO THE PEOPLES PARTY OF LANE COUNTY, OREGON:

In the absence of our chairman, and in accordance with a resolution passed by the Peoples Party at the meeting in Eugene, Oregon, Feb 19, 1898, I hereby call the county convention of the Peoples Party of Lane county, Oregon, to meet in Eugene on Wednesday, March 16, 1898, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., to elect a chairman, and central committee, and delegates to the State convention, and to transact any other business that may be necessary to keep the organization of the party intact, to be used in the campaign of 1900, if it should be deemed wise and the best thing to do.

The basis of representation in the county convention, will be one delegate from each precinct and one for every 20 votes and equal or majority fraction thereof of the vote cast in the precinct for Congressman at the last general election in 1896.
