JAMES BARGER.
Succumbed to Heart Failure Last Night at His Home Below Coburg.

Daily Guard, Feb 27.

The sad news reached Eugene this morning that James Barger expired from heart failure last night at his farm four miles below Coburg. From information at hand it is learned that the end came suddenly and peacefully. In company with his son John Mr Barger had been busily engaged during the past week putting in spring grain, and it is supposed that he had overworked himself. The only details known are that, during the night, John awoke, with a feeling that something was wrong, and reaching over to place his hands on his father found him cold in death. A messenger was at once despatched to this city to notify his wife and children residing here.

This morning Jerry Horn and James Taylor, son-in-law of the deceased, accompanied by Undertaker R M Day, went down to prepare the body for removal to this city. At this time no arrangements for the funeral have been made.

(James Barger was born in Morgan county, Missouri, July 1, 1832, and was at the time of his death aged 65 years, 8 months and 1 day. He was married in Monitor county, Missouri, March 6, 1864, to Mary Jane Finley, who survives him. A year later they came to Oregon, going to New York and thence by steamer, arriving in Salem, Oregon, February, 14, 1865. Shortly afterward they settled on the farm below Coburg, where he lived, and has resided there most of the time since, part of the time living on their residence property in this city. Deceased leaves besides a wife, seven children: Will Barger, Irving; Robert L Barger, Northport, Wash; Mrs James Taylor, Eugene; Mrs Jerry Horn, Eugene; Walter Barger, Peoria; John P and George, of this city.

Deceased was universally respected for those many sturdy virtues possessed by the hardy pioneers, and his large circle of acquaintances will learn of his death with genuine sorrow. He was a member of Eugene lodge No 11, A F & A M, and the funeral services will be held under their auspices.

The funeral will occur tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence in this city, corner of 7th and 11th Lawrence streets, to the Masonic cemetery.

A BROKEN BACK.
Submarine Investigations Lead to the Belief That the Maine Was Wrecked by a Mine.

New York, March 2.—A Herald dispatch from Havana says: The Maine's back was broken. Later discoveries made by divers not only support the information printed by the Herald concerning the disclosures of paramount importance by Esign Powellson, but convince those in charge of the submarine investigation that a mine rent the battle-ship asunder. The keel of the ship was found in two pieces, the nearest ends of which are now separated by a distance of 2 1/2 to 3 feet. The sections are no longer lying in one straight line, but show the effect of a force executed from port to starboard.

It is evident from the discovery of the present condition of the keel that the section of the bottom found 25 feet from its natural position was wrenched from its belt by the first explosion and driven upward. The keel itself was broken in two and then collapsed in two sections and fell in the position the divers found it yesterday.
