

N w, ort News: "Professor F L Washburn, of the State University, and Mr B J Bretherton, of New port, have associated themselves together for the jurpose of carrying on investigations as to the fishing resources of Yaquina bay from an economic and scientific standpoint.

"The results of their investigations will be published and distributed free by the State University and through the press, and it is hoped will have the result of attracting both capital and the labor that it employs to Yaquina

"Neither of these gentlemen desire or will obtain any financial benefits from their labors, and it is hoped that the people of Yaquina bay will lend them every assistance in their power by sending any examples of strange and little known fish that may fail into their hands."

#### A Big Lumber Raft.

The first lumber raft built after the designs of John Poulsen, of Inman & Poulsen, and to be towed from Port and to San Francisco, will not put to sea as early as at first intended, but the plan has by no means been abandoned.

Mr Poulsen has changed his original design comewhat and will now use wire cables to hold the raft together vertically instead of iron belts. There will be 320 sections of cable on cach six months crossing the plains in the side and 46 at each and of the big raft, centaining 5,000,000 feet of lumber.
