SUDDEN DEATH.

Miss Olive Kuykendall Died of Heart Failure Today.

This morning about 10 o'clock as Miss Olive Kuykendall, aged 15, was on her way to school she suddenly fainted, apparently, and fell just as she entered the Central school grounds.

Her fall and hastened to her, the young lady was carried to the house of her parents, Dr and Mrs Kuykendall.

Every effort toward resuscitation was made, but without avail. About 12:50 she breathed her last, but having regained consciousness death resulted either from heart failure or the turning of a clot on the brain.

The young lady who was about 15 years of age, was the second daughter of Mr and Mrs W Kuykendall and resided in this city from early childhood. She was a member of the school grade of the public schools, of its brightest pupils and a general favorite with all her associates.

Her death was a sudden and unexpected blow to her relatives and friends who are all stricken.

DEMOCRATS FOR UNION.

A Full Report of the County Convention.

IT WAS HARMONIOUS.

Robert Clow, chairman of the democratic county central committee called the convention to order at Parker's opera house at 11 o'clock.

On motion, J J Walton was elected temporary chairman. He made a speech that abounded with many good reasons for the success of the silver movement.

On motion H J Day was elected secretary.

On motion a committee of five on credentials was appointed as follows: C M Kissenger, J W Baker, J E P Withers, Robt Clow, George Smith.

A committee consisting of Robt Clow, James Parker and W P Chesbire was appointed as a committee on permanent organization and order of business.

The committee on order of business reported as follows which was adopted: 1 Election of permanent officers.

2 Election of county central committee, chairman and clerk. 3 Committee on resolutions. 4 Election of 14 delegates to the State convention.

5 Nominations for county officers. A motion was made and carried that the temporary officers be made permanent. Judge Walton thanked the convention for the honor.

On motion J J Walton was elected as chairman of the county central committee and L L Stevens as secretary.

On motion L L Stevens, Horace Mann and I L Campbell were appointed a committee on resolutions.

POPULISTS FOR UNION.

Without One Dissenting Voice Their County Convention Favors Union of Reform Forces.

THE REPORT IN FULL.

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock at the Salvation Army barracks by R P Caldwell of Junction.

As J D Sutherland, chairman of the county central committee, was out of the county.

A S Patterson of Eugene was elected as temporary chairman and E Yarnell of Mohawk secretary and S K George assistant secretary.

Mr Amis made a motion which was carried that if any precincts were unrepresented by any regularly elected delegate any populist from that precinct would be given a seat in the convention.

The chairman appointed as a committee on credentials G W Weider, Eugene; R P Caldwell, Junction; and A M Sweeney, Cottage Grove.

On permanent organization, W H Spangh, S K George and Dr Snapp. J A J Crow of Coyote precinct made a short speech while the committees were formulating their reports, in which he said that while he had been considered a middle-of-the-road populist, he was selected as a delegate to do what he could for a union of the reform forces; that he held a proxy to vote for the same thing; said he had found out it was best to do what the people wanted, and that they all wanted union. The applause which greeted Mr Crow's speech showed that the convention was strictly a union one, with no discussion.

On motion the convention adjourned to 1 p m, to allow committees to prepare their reports.

ORDER OF BUSINESS. The first order of business was the selection of a chairman of the county central committee. On motion A J Zumwalt was elected by acclamation.

As delegates to the state convention the following were selected: G U Snapp, F M Nighswander, R P Caldwell, G W Weider, A A Foster, Frank Kirk, J C Richardson, A J Zumwalt, W W Withers, A M Sweeney, J E Yarnell, D R Lakin.

HARMONIOUS RESOLUTIONS. The following resolutions were presented and unanimously carried, before the selection of delegates, and were received with great applause and with absolutely no dissent:

WHEREAS, The peoples party stands pledged to do all in its power to restore the policy of the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the existing ratio which was substantially the policy of the government from the administration of Washington to that of Grant, and which was advocated by statesmen of all parties for more than 80 years of our national existence; and

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WHEREAS, The republican party has now thrown off the mask and stands avowedly for the single gold standard and for the further demoralization of silver, and the retirement of greenbacks and other currency, and converting the same into interest-bearing bonds and is for establishing a reprehensible banking system; all of which is destructive to the mass of the people and beneficial only to the moneyed class; and

WHEREAS, The democratic and free silver republican parties agree substantially with the peoples party on the financial question and as to the necessity of reform on state and county government,

RESOLVED, That the peoples party of Lane county is in favor of uniting with the democratic and silver republican parties in the approaching election, and that the delegates elected by this convention to the state convention are hereby instructed to use all reasonable efforts to effect such a union of reform forces.

RESOLVED, That this convention is unalterably in favor of the system of direct legislation, or the initiative and referendum.

On motion of Mr Foster a committee of five was appointed as follows to confer with like committees from the democratic and silver republican parties. The chair appointed A A Foster, G T Birch, J C Richardson, R P Caldwell and L B Rossman.

Arrangement for the joint conference of committees was made to meet at once at H D Norton's office, whither they went.

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION. The committee on permanent organization and order of business reported that the temporary order of business be made permanent. The order of business presented (1) election of chairman of central committee; (2) election of 12 delegates to the state convention of peoples party; (3) nomination of county surveyor; (4) we hereby recommend and endorse the plan of organization on union lines as proposed by the Union county central committee outlined in its resolutions of Feb 19, 1898; and we also recommend the platform as adopted at the Albany convention Aug 2, 1897.

On motion the report of committee was adopted by sections.

The convention made a few changes and alterations and same was adopted. The report of the conference committee was read and unanimously adopted. Harvey Taylor of Cottage Grove, was nominated by acclamation for surveyor.

On motion Mr Zumwalt was empowered to select his own secretary of the county central committee.

On motion adjourned.

SILVER REPUBLICANS. Met in Mass Convention at City Hall and Elected Delegates to the State Convention.

According to the call a mass convention of Silver Republicans convened in the City Hall in Eugene at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Chas H Baker of Camp Creek precinct, was elected chairman, and W K Scarborough of Eugene, secretary. J G Stevenson and T D Linton of Eugene, C H Baker of Camp Creek precinct, Eli Perkins of Spencer and James Hayes of Junction, were elected delegates to the Silver Republican State convention.

Chas H Baker was unanimously elected permanent chairman of the Lane county Silver Republican party. [Resolutions passed will be published tomorrow.]

AGREED TO UNITE.

Democrats, Populists, and Silver Republicans Vote to Fight Together.
