COMPLETE CHANGE OF FRONT.

Resolutions of Oregon State Republican Conventions on the Money Question.

A party, like a man, should be judged by its utterances, and the performances of the pledges made in its platforms.

That test we apply to the Republican party and ask the intelligent voters of Lane county and the State of Oregon to judge it as they would an individual under similar circumstances.

The Republican party of Oregon in state convention assembled in 1890 declared:

"That, recognizing the fact that the United States is the greatest silver producing country in the world, and that both gold and silver were equally the money of the constitution from the beginning of the republic until the hostile legislation against silver, which unduly contracted the circulating medium of the country, and recognizing that the great interests of the people demand more money for use in the channels of trade and commerce, therefore we declare ourselves in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver and denounce any attempt to discriminate against silver as unwise and unjust."

In 1892 the party had the same light and resolved:

"Fifth, thoroughly believing that gold and silver form the basis of all circulating mediums, we endorse the amended coinage act of the last republican congress, by which the entire production of the silver mines of the United States is added to the currency of the people."

In 1894 they sought to crawl out from their previous position through the "international" hole:

"We re-affirm the doctrine of the republican party in relation to money as stated in its national platform of 1893, particularly as follows to-wit: 'The American people from tradition and interest favor bimetalism and the republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as standard money. We commend the efforts made by our government hitherto to secure an international conference, to adopt such measures as will insure parity of value between gold and silver throughout the world, and call upon it to renew and continue such efforts.'"

Now look upon the Mark Hanna-McKinley Republican platform, of the present year and state campaign, and weep for the frailty and instability of human nature:

"We are in favor of the maintenance of the present gold standard; we are unqualifiedly opposed to the free coinage of silver."

How can a great party with such a record for inconsistency on the great issue of the day ask the votes and confidence of the people?

"INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENT."

Register: "The republican party went into power on the St Louis platform, pledged to retain the present gold standard until such

time as international agreement could be offered, and they have used every means practicable to fulfill the pledge.

"President McKinley appointed a monetary commission, which visited Europe, and after three months of faithful effort, returned and reported that the effort was futile, that the powers of Europe would not co-operate, and that President McKinley, his cabinet advisers and every representative of the administration at foreign posts did all possible to assist the commission in doing their work."

Yes, "they have used every means practicable to fulfill the pledge" "to maintain the present gold standard." The commission appointed by President McKinley, in pursuance of the "international agreement" fake in the platform on which he was elected, had a majority hostile to free coinage of silver. Then they went to England, that has every interest in maintaining the present gold standard as she is the great creditor nation of the world, made a show of proposing bimetalism, when they did not mean it, and at the first convenient opportunity sneaked home.

Worst of all while the commission was in England the McKinley administration proposed the gold bond-greenback retirement scheme, an unequivocal notice that it was not sincere in effort to restore silver to its former position as money.

Never has a great party shown, to such disadvantage as did the Republican party in this subterfuge to escape fulfillment of a pledge. It lost self respect and became the laughing stock of the world in the vain endeavor to appear earnest in the work that it did in a perfunctory manner. It is seldom than an honest intelligent Republican mentions this "international agreement" fiasco. It is a thing to be ashamed of rather than to introduce as a defense of the financial policy of the Republican party.

WHAT MANNER OF MAN IS HE?

If anyone ever had the least suspicion that Dr Chapman was not blessed with a super-abundant amount of gall he will revise his opinion on learning that that worthy had the unlimited assurance to make arrangements for the expense of entertainment of Mr King during his stay in Eugene. It is needless to say his proffer was not accepted.

What manner of man is this president of the State University that places himself in such an indelicate situation?

Mr King will be elected governor, and will have the appointing of several University regents. Chapman turned the coat of his political principles from a silver advocate to a gold standard apologist to curry favor with a Republican governor. Now he would attempt to retain favor by most contemptible trucking and self abasement. Does Chapman think he can purchase favor with the price of a night's lodging and entertainment? Never was the small caliber of the man made more apparent.

THE DEADLY CIGARETTE.

Just think of it! 90 per cent of cigarette smokers rejected in army medical examination! No wonder physicians have long been sounding a warning note as to the deadly evil of this most pernicious habit. This showing should encourage legislation to prohibit the manufacture of the deadly little smoker. There is a gruesome side to the glory that attaches to war. For instance the war department has made arrangements for a hospital corps of 180 physicians, 30 surgeons and 50 assistant surgeons, with 160 hospital stewards, and 1200 privates. Evidently they are aware some one is liable to get hurt down in Cuba.

The young war cock of the German empire intimates he expects a voice in the ultimate disposition of the Philippine islands. The European land robbers are insatiable. They desire the earth and never refuse to take any small portion thereof that comes within their clutches. But the United States bird is better bred, younger,

and with stronger pinions than the German eagle. Emperor William should not attempt to fly his bird too far away from home.

We hear many compliments on the manly bearing, personal appearance, and intellectual capacity of Mr King, Union candidate for governor, as shown in his appearance before two audiences in Eugene yesterday. With his legal and mental qualifications is another important factor. King is a clean man politically and morally. His private or public life has not been tainted with even the least suspicion of wrong doing.

The House of Representatives understands the temper of the people. It has again passed the resolution in favor of the election of United States senators by direct vote by the decisive vote of 184 to 11. The reform cannot come too soon.
