Tue-day, May 24, was the 79th birthday of Alexandrie Victoria, Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, and Empress of India. She was born at Kensington Palace May 24, 1819, her parents who had been residing abroad for some time having hastened home in order that their child might "be bern

Queen Victoria succeeded her uncle, William IV, June 20, 1837 as Victoria I. Until a few weeks previous to the coronation her life had been passed in comparative quiet and retirement. Was married February 10, 1840 to her cousin Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg Gotten. To them were born nine children. Prince Albert died December 14,

This is the 51st year of her reign, and those fifty-one years represent more to the cause of civilization, to advancement in the arts and sciences than ten times that number of the previous years. The race from which she sprung and which she rules has been a potent factor in the world's progress. The Anglo Saxon, the English and the German, have played important parts on the world's stage since the then maiden Victoria assumed the crown in 1837.
