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BROUGHT TO EUGENE.
Indian Harney Charged With Killing a "Native Son."
STORY OF THE OCCURRENCE
Daily Guard, August 11.
One "good" Indian and a brother barely missing that condition is the story of the Florence tragedy.
Last night's stage brought to this city Constable E. A. Evans of Florence precinct, having in charge Jeff Harney, a Coos Bay Indian aged about 50 whom he turned over to the Sheriff who placed him in jail. Harney killed another Indian named Bennett Barney aged 21 at Florence Saturday night, and badly wounded another named Henry Jackson aged about 45. The instrument he used was a pocket knife with a blade about four inches long.
Constable Evans' story of the affair indicates that the prisoner who bears a good reputation, is not to blame for the unfortunate occurrence. To a GUARD reporter he outlined the matter as follows:
On the afternoon of Saturday about six of the Indians living at Indiantown two miles above Florence on North Fork came to town and spent the afternoon drinking. Among them were the murdered man and his companion. Harney was also in town and had been with the other Indians some. He did not usually associate with the Indian town braves and for that reason was not liked by them. About 8:30 in the evening the men from Indiantown went to their boats about 200 yards from the city wharves intending to leave for home. The liquor they drank placed them in a fighting condition and they agreed that Barney and Jackson should go back to town, get Harney and take him with them and for general reasons give him a dressing. As Harney lived a short distance up the river he accepted the men's invitation for a ride home. They commenced quarreling with him on reaching the boat, finally pushing Harney in the river and striking him on the head with an oar. He managed to get out and with his knife stabbed Jackson two times under the floating ribs. Jackson then ran away and Barney took up the fight whereupon Harney stabbed him in the abdomen, the blade entering from the side.
It was about 11 o'clock that Al Reddy, who lives about 400 yards from where the Indians landed, notified the constable that there was a dead Indian lying in front of his house. The young brave had started for town and went that far collapsing from loss of blood.
Constable Evans, accompanied by his father, Dr. R. L. Evans, took charge of the dead Indian. Harney was then arrested, and as before stated, brought to this city.
The braves of Indiantown are from the Coos Bay, Rogue River and Umpqua tribes and by their dissolute habits frequently cause trouble. Jeff Harney does not live with them and has always had a good reputation among the white people on the river who are ready to give his version of the affair full credit.
WAIVED EXAMINATION.
On being taken before Justice Holden Harney waived examination and was therefore committed to jail without bonds, and will be held until the October term of circuit court for Lane county.
SUDDEN DEATH.
Kent Jones, a Well Known Pioneer Drops Dead.

EXECUTOR'S WORK
Some of John Linn's Relatives Have Been Found.
A HORRIBLE TALE.

P. H. Stephenson, executor of the estate of J. A. Linn, who was murdered at Isham's Corral on the McKenzie, June 15, is still in the city looking after the interests of the estate in this county.
The horses which Branton and Green left along the road on their rapid drive down have nearly all been located and Frank Armstrong of Condon, arrived over yesterday to drive the horses back to their range. He will be accompanied by one man. The object of Mr. Armstrong's trip was erroneously stated in yesterday's issue owing to a typographical error. They go first to Seavy's pasture to get the 42 head pastured there, and will get a few at Branton's place on the McKenzie, and at other points on the river, and expect to take back nearly if not all of the 60 head Linn started over with.
Mr. Stephenson informed a GUARD reporter yesterday that he heard from C. E. Linn, of Central City, Neb., a brother of the murdered man. The letter stated that the two brothers spelled their names different, the one writing contending that the family name was "Linn," while the murdered man insisted that it was "Linn", and each stuck to his opinion. The letter further stated that Linn had one brother and three sisters. Two of the sisters have been heard from. Miss Benetta Johnson of Cambridge, Illinois, writes that her mother is a sister of Linn, and Mrs. C. L. Goodell, of Monroe, Indiana, says that she is also his sister.
Mr. Stephenson joined Mr. Armstrong today and went out to see that he started with the horses all right, and will return to Eugene this evening, expecting to leave for his home tomorrow. He is much impressed with Eugene as a business town and home city, saying particularly that there is not another town in Oregon the size of Eugene that has as progressive and up-to-date business men or well appointed stores. Mr. Stephenson is himself one of the prominent merchants of Condon, his home city.
A HORRIBLE TALE.
In this connection it might be well to tell a story of the murder that is being repeated by many from McKenzie Bridge to Cobb's sheep camp across the mountains, having been told to Mr. Armstrong by a Mr. Ward, who has a claim at Lost Creek. According to this story it was first told by either Branton or Green, and is to the effect that after Linn had been shot and thrown on the fire he came to and cried out, "For God's sake, don't burn me alive, boys," whereupon Branton picked up a club, and silenced the victim by breaking his skull. As the story has gained considerable circulation it is given for what it is worth. It is probably false.
HEAVY FOREST FIRES.
A Section of Country 25x10 Miles Burning.
A letter has just been received by George Millican, of Crook county, well known in Lane county, telling of one of the largest forest fires known in Eastern Oregon for years.
The fire started about ten days ago on Pine mountain, near the ice caves, about 40 miles south of Prineville, in Crook county. At the time the letter was written it had extended to the Paulina mountains, covering a section of country about 25x10 miles in extent, destroying a vast amount of pine timber. The country burned over is uninhabited.
It is thought that the smoke that has been invading the valley from the eastward is the result of this great fire.

STAGE ACCIDENT.
Mr Seymour of Acme, Breaks a Collar Bone.

Last Monday a Mr. Seymour of Acme fell from the seat of a Sinclair stage at the noon stopping place about 30 miles west of Eugene and broke a collar bone. He had picked up the lines and started the horses up, before Jesse Bounds, the driver, had gotten in the wagon. After going a few feet one wheel ran upon a rock, pitching Mr. Seymour out. He was at once taken to Gleaners and Dr. Evans of Florence summoned, who attended the injured man.
That Mr. Bounds the driver was in no way to blame the following letter from Mr. Seymour's son will attest:
Gleaners, Aug. 10, 1898.
Mr. E. Bangs, Dear Sir: Jesse stopped here this noon to see my father and he feels very bad over the accident and he seems to think you will blame him to some extent. Now I do not blame him one bit and hope you will not do so. There is no one to blame but father himself. He is one of these kind that if there is any thing going on he wants a hand in and he wanted to drive and he got hurt from his own driving. Of course, we are all sorry it happened, and it will be an expense, but I think I will pull through some way. Father is doing very well. He is resting easy. There were not as many bones broken as we thought. Hoping you will not blame Jesse any, I remain,

"Veter" Writes Again.
EDITOR GUARD:—In Mr. McClung's reply to "Voter" in Monday's GUARD he says in part:
"As voter seems to be laboring under a misapprehension in regard to the absent director of this school district, I beg leave to state that there is no vacancy, as he indicates by citing the section requiring a special election to be called when a vacancy occurs by reason of death, resignation or otherwise. This section has no bearing at this time for the reason that Mr. Gilbert is not dead. His resignation has not been accepted and no otherwise circumstances have occurred to cause a vacancy."
I will admit that from last account Mr. Gilbert is not dead, yet I maintain that a vacancy exists in the board notwithstanding that fact as contemplated by law. Mr. Gilbert doubtless felt that he would be absent from an indefinite time and believed it to be his duty to resign as director of the district else he would not have done so. When he performed that act a vacancy existed notwithstanding the refusal of the remaining members of the board to accept his resignation, since they have no power under the law to accept or have any control over it. If one director can resign and his resignation held up two might do so and so might they all and the district left without a board. It matters not whether Mr. Gilbert left Oregon at all or not or the school district for that matter. When he put in his resignation a vacancy existed and it is not for the remaining members to say that there is no vacancy.
As for the statement in Mr. McClung's letter that nothing but routine business is liable to come up during the rest of the year, that has nothing at all to do with the case. Business of importance is liable to occur at any time. Teachers may resign and vacancies have to be filled as was done a short time ago and if but two directors are on the board a deadlock might take place and business stop. The district is entitled to a full board of directors to transact its business and it is the duty of the present members to see that the board is filled. This has not been written with any spirit of criticism but merely to call the attention of the board and the people to the facts in the case.

MALATE FIGHT
Fifteen Americans Killed in the Assault.
ELEVEN FULL SUNDAY NIGHT.
Cavite, Manila Bay, Aug 3, via Hong Kong Aug 9.—The first shedding of American blood on Philippine soil took place Sunday night, when 11 soldiers were killed and 44 wounded during a skirmish at the Malate trenches, between Cavite and Manila.
No attack has yet been made on the Spanish line, but the Americans now hold the trenches formerly held by the insurgents. In Sunday night's skirmish the following were killed:

Private Fred Buckland, of the Thirtieth Minnesota.
Some of the wounded in Monday night's skirmish were struck by shrapnel.
