



Professor Gardiner then explained that he did not mean an alliance as the word is understood in Europe-a military co-partnership-but a strong commercial alliance, protected an arbitration treaty which would, in his estimation, better assure universal peace than any other thing that could be brought about. He then went on to show that America had profited more by the markets opened through Great Britain's efforts than any other nation, save Great Britain herself. For these great benefits, he held, America should give something in return, and an alliance such as he suggested would make the Anglo-Saxon race masters of the world, not less to the advantage of America than of Great Britain.

WIKOFF A PESTHOLE.

Senn Warns the Government of the Danger-Camp Should Be Broken. New York, Sept. 1 .- Modical officers at Camp Wikoff deny that there have been deaths at the camp from yellow fever. Two men whose deaths yesterday are said to be attributable to the disease named, were, according to the surgeons in charge, victims of a pernicious malarial fever, which is frequently mistaken for yellow fever. Dr. Senn, assistant surgeon-general, is

quoted as saying today at Camp Wikoff: "In justice to the camp, I want to say that almost none of the sickness among the soldiers up to the present time and none of the deaths have been due to conditions which prevail here. The sickness has been alomst entirely limited to fevers contracted in the South, and the death rate would have been much higher than now had the men remained in the South instead of being brought here."

Several hundred cots this morning were put in the different hospitals. There is now enough room to accommodate all the sick.

Dr. Senn, who believes the government should take more sanitary procautions at Camp Wikoff, when asked if he had brought his views before the Washington authorities, said: "I have not done so in connection

with Camp Wikoff. My protests in regard to other camps have passed unheeded. In regard to Camp Wikoff, I have written an article embodying all my views, which will be printed in a medical journal over my signature, and I will be reported to the authorities in Washington I am sure. Then I will be asked about and will emphasize my opinions. I want to say that unless this camp is cleared out within six weeks, it will be the worse infected place in the United States. The soil will be permeated with typhoid. It will be worse than it has been at any time at Chickamauga.

"In regard to that camp, I want to say that I warned the Washington authorities before the soldiers were sent there that fever would result from massing a body of men there. I told them that the water supply was insufficient, and the use of the river water would result in typhoid fever. My protests went unheeded. The result was shown when I was in Porto Rico with General Miles. Almost the first men sent there were from Chickamauga. They were run down and half sick, and were in no condition to stand the climate. General Brooke noticed their weakness, and I told him the cause of it. I asked him to notify the Washington authorities and have Chickamauga camp broken up. He did so at once, and the evacuation of the place

followed. "I want to say that had as Chickamauga was, the situation will be far worse unless this camp is broken up. In six weeks I predict that it will be, instead of recuperation, a horror camp worthy to rank with the infamous pestholes of the civil war."

Determined to Get at the Bottom of the Charges. New York, Sept. 1 .- Ten soldiers



"It is objected that we will abrogate the Monroe doctrine; but that doctrine, freed from its academic cobwebs, is the nonintervention of European powers in matters relating to the American continent. Its converse is nonintervention

of America in matters relating to the European continent. That has nothing to do with American intervention in Asia nor with legitimate expansion of our territory in the Orient. If we are abrogating the doctrine, it must be because the Orient is exclusively for Orientals, and not for English and Russians, and Germans and French and Hollanders, who are all there now and

are fast appropriating the Orient to themselves.

"Finally, it is objected that we will be involved in entangling alliances, and will depart from precepts of Washing-ton's farewell address; but Spain provoked continuous trouble at our very doors for a hundred years. Mexico and Central and South America have had revolutions without number; Great Britain bounds our territory for thousands of miles; and yet, for a century. we have avoided entangling alliances, although both propinquity and provocation exist. "The nations of Europe are encen-

They were seized with cramps and perished before help could reach them. The bodies were recovered.

The money was consigned by the First National bank of Omaha to the Citizens' National bank of St. Paul, Minn. It was placed in a small iron safe in the delivery wagon of the ex-press company and in the custody of George Archibald, driver, started toward the depot. En route, Archibald stopped at several wholesale houses for other packages. He drove down an alley and went in for a package of jewelry at the shipping door of a jewelry house. The killed are: 8 George Whiting, aged 50; Jesse Whiting, aged 18; George Whiting, jr., aged 13; Sadie Whiting, aged 20; a boy not identified.

Likely Soon to Follow the Death of King Malleton,

Washington, Sept. 1 .- The state department has not yet been officially advised of the reported death of King Malietoa, of Samoa, and in all likelihood must remain in official ignorance of the event for some time to come, owing to the slow means of communication at the disposal of the department.

It is the general impression here that the death of the king will result in the overthrow of the present form of government of the islands, maintained as it is by the joint action of the United States, Great Britain and Germany.

Official reports to the state department show that this government is the most expensive and unsatisfactory of any in the world, having regard to the population of the Samoan group. In the capital city, Apia, there is maintained a tripartite municipal government of vast proportionate expense, while the reports show that 82 ratepayers are obliged to bear the entire


