**THE CUBAN DEBT**

The United States Will Assume City Debts.—Under No Obligation to Pay General Debt.

Existing Contracts to be Honored.  
 New York, Oct 19.—A dispatch to the World from Washington says: The United States will assume the indebtedness of the Cuban municipalities, but will not agree to pay or guarantee any portion of the general Cuban debt.

This statement was made to the World correspondent by the highest authority in Washington at this time. There can be no doubt as to its correctness.

By this recession from the original instructions to the American commission, the Spanish commission has won a victory. The instructions to the American commission were that they were not to consider or discuss the question of the Cuban or Porto Rico debt.

The debt of the municipalities of Cuba will be assumed by the United States and prorated among the municipalities when a permanent government is established. In making this concession the Americans were actuated by a desire to protect American interests. The water works, electric-lighting plants and other municipal improvements were largely constructed by American capital, the bonus being guaranteed by the Spanish government.

State department officers say that the assumption of the Cuban municipal debt was contemplated from the outset in the event of Spain making the plea that the indebtedness was incurred in improving the condition of the island. This view is indorsed by international lawyers. As Spain did not derive any benefit from the money expended in improvements in Cuba and will not in future, jurists say it is only proper that the United States assume the indebtedness for municipal works. The contracts already made for municipal improvements will also be honored by the American government.

A Number of Matters Fully Considered.

**A FULL REPORT.**

Daily Guard, Oct 19.  
 The City Council met in adjourned session last night.

Present: Mayor Koykendall and Councilmen Osburn, Luckey, Fisher, Haines and Roney. Absent: Councilman Horn.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.  
 Finance committee reported favorably on a number of bills and they were ordered paid.

Councilman Luckey from the street committee, submitted report for month ending October 10th. Total amount new lumber used, 8102 feet; old lumber used, 1688 feet; No. 16 gravel 17; fines worked, 6 days.

Petition read from T G Hendricks, Mrs A Harding and F M Wilkins for a sewer on Ninth street, east to lateral sewer, between Olive and Charnelton street; referred to committee on fire and water with power to act.

Councilman Fisher presented a remonstrance against the proposed sewer from Twelfth street north to the main sewer in the alley between Pearl and High streets; read and ordered laid on the table. The remonstrance represented 2800 feet of the proposed sewer.

Councilman Osburn read the deed from H R Kincaid, corrected so as to conform to his proposition; accepted by the council.

Councilman Fisher moved that the action of the council accepting the proposition of Mr Kincaid to deed for land to give full width to Thirteenth street between the University campus and his land be reconsidered. Yeas and nays called for.

Councilmen voting yeas: Haines, Fisher, Roney, 3; nays: Osburn, Lucky, 2. Carried.

Councilman Luckey moved to lay the whole matter on the table. Yeas and nays called. Voting yeas: Osburn, Haines and Lucky, 3; nays: Fisher, Roney. Carried.

A number of bills were read and ordered paid.  
 Rules were suspended and bill of Geo Young for \$4 75 and A W Prince for \$11 40 were ordered paid.

Councilman Osburn moved that the superintendent of sewers be instructed to ascertain and report at next meeting all persons maintaining water closets or cesspools within 100 feet of any public sewer and not connected with such sewer.

On motion, adjourned.

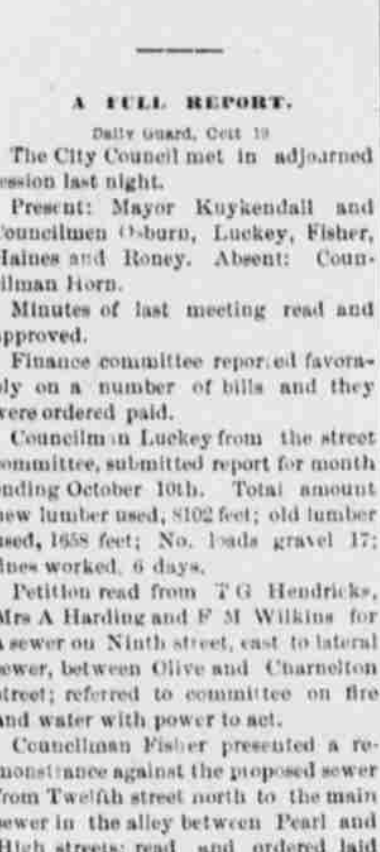
**From a Traveler.**
