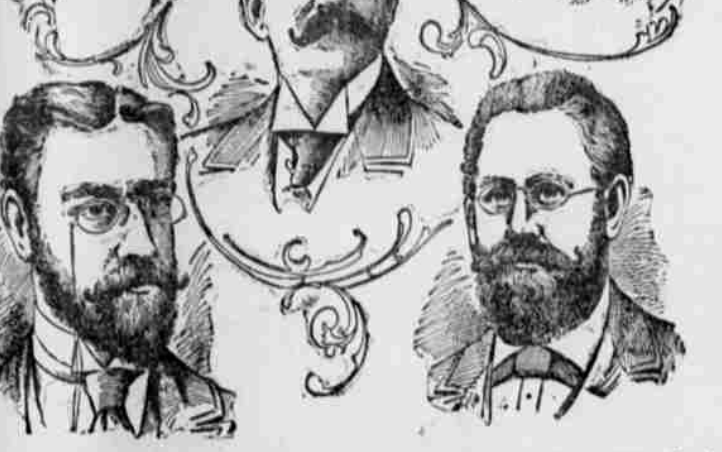

TWO "NOT TRUE BILLS"

The grand jury today reported on the following commitments:
State of Oregon vs Linn Alexander; larceny. The grand jury, Thursday afternoon, returned "a true bill." Alexander is accused of robbing Frederick McIntyre, October 5, 1898, while in the city jail, of \$45.50.

State of Oregon vs Henry Van Slyke; larceny in a dwelling. The grand jury returned "not a true bill." This is the man that was held for larceny in the T. G. Hendricks' residence.

State of Oregon vs Frank Hughes; assault with a dangerous weapon. Grand jury returned "not a true bill." This is the young man who indulged in a cutting-errand at Hayes' hop yard near Creswell this fall.

MURDER CASE

Claude Branton Enters Plea of "Not Guilty."

IMPORTANT PROCEEDINGS

Trial Set For Next Monday Morning at 9 O'Clock.

BRANTON'S MOTION.

DAILY GUARD Oct 28
The grand jury this forenoon at 10 o'clock brought in an indictment against Claude Branton charging him with murder in the first degree in the following words:

In the Circuit court of the State of Oregon in and for Lane county:
STATE OF OREGON vs CLAUDE BRANTON.

Claude Branton is accused by the grand jury of Lane county, by this indictment with the crime of MURDER in the FIRST DEGREE committed as follows, to wit:

In Lane county, Oregon, on the 15th day of June, 1898, the aforesaid Claude Branton then and there being in said county and state, did then and there on the said 15th day of June, A. D. 1898, feloniously, purposely, and of deliberate and premeditated malice kill John A. Linn by means unknown to the grand jury, contrary to the statute in such case made and provided and against the peace and dignity of the State of Oregon.

Dated at Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, this 28th day of October, A. D. 1898.

At 10 o'clock Branton was arraigned and took his day to plead.

His attorneys, L. Bilyeu and Hale & Norton asked to be allowed until Saturday morning to enter plea, but Judge Hamilton overruled the motion and set 9 o'clock tomorrow as the time to enter plea.

It is rumored that the defense will ask that the case be continued until the next term of court, but the state will resist with all its power.

Branton appeared in court with a smile on his face, and did not seem to realize the grave indictment.

DAILY GUARD Oct 27
Claude Branton, who was indicted by the grand jury yesterday for the crime of murder, was brought into the circuit court this morning at 9 o'clock and entered a plea of "not guilty," as charged.

The attorneys for the defendant then asked that they be allowed until Monday morning to file a motion for continuance of the trial.

The court ordered that the attorneys file their motion at 1 o'clock, today, Thursday.

MOTION FOR CONTINUANCE.

Court convened at 1 o'clock. The attorneys for the defendant, L. Bilyeu and H. D. Norton, filed the following motion for a continuance:

In the Circuit court for the State of Oregon for Lane county.
State of Oregon vs Claude Branton: I, Claude Branton, being first duly sworn on oath say: That I am the defendant in the above entitled action.

That I was required by the court to plead and did plead to the indictment hereto, of "not guilty."

That plea was entered at the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., of October 27, 1898, by order of said court.

CITY COUNCIL

The Kincaid Proposition Received Its Quietus.

BILLS ALLOWED.

DAILY GUARD, Oct 27.
The council met in special session last evening at 8 o'clock.

Present: Mayor Koykendall and Councilmen Osburn, Roney, Fisher, Haines, Luckey and Horn.

The Mayor called the council to order and stated that the object of the meeting was to dispose of the Thirteenth street improvement, which was laid on the table last evening.

Councilman Osburn moved that the Thirteenth street improvement be now taken from the table.

The vote on the motion resulted in a tie, the Mayor gave the casting vote in favor of the motion and declared the motion carried.

Councilman Osburn then moved that H. R. Kincaid's second proposition to deed land on Thirteenth street be accepted.

[This proposition was that Mr. Kincaid would deed to the city the thirty feet in width of ground in Thirteenth street the entire distance of his property, some 940 feet in length, provided that the city would grade and gravel the same and build a good six foot side walk along the front of it and maintain the street and sidewalk as long as the property of Mr. Kincaid's remained unplatted to city lots.]

The yeas and nays were called for. The vote resulted as follows: Yeas—Osburn, Luckey, 2. Nays—Fisher, Roney, Haines, Horn, 4.

Motion declared lost. The rules were suspended and the following bills were ordered paid.

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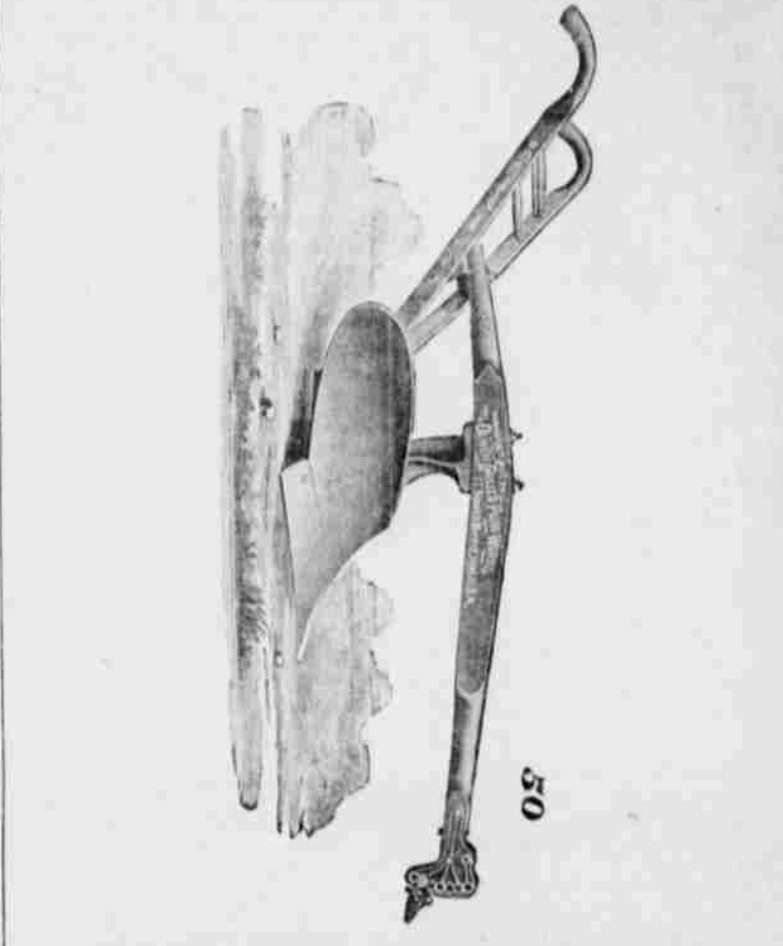

10-STAMP MILL

Blue River Mining District Coming to the Front.

LARGE FORCE OF MEN.

The Blue River mining district has been prospected by miners ever since the early '60's and it has been known that the quartz was rich in gold. During the past five years considerable permanent development work has been indulged in. The Lucky Boy mine, owned by the Brownville company has run several feet of tunnels and uncovered a rich ledge.

About a month ago F. C. Sharkey, a member of the Zimmerman Packing Co., of Portland, and a well known miner, with other associates, purchased an extensive interest in the claims. Mr. Sharkey has taken personal supervision of the mine and now has a force of men building a road to his newly acquired property, and is also building a number of cabins for workmen.

A ten-stamp quartz mill, of the latest pattern has been ordered from Chicago and is expected to arrive in Eugene in about two or three weeks. The mill will be taken to the mines at once and in due time will be placed in position. By early spring it will be hammering gold out of the rich quartz of that district.

This means much to Eugene and Lane county. Before many months we also expect to see mills located on the newly rich discoveries of the South fork of Fall Creek.

Frank and John Stewart left today for the mines with two heavily laden freight wagons consigned to Mr. Sharkey.

ADDITIONAL NEWS.

The GUARD this morning received a letter from Blue River which says Mr. Sharkey has hired forty men to work on the four miles of road needed to reach the Lucky Boy mine. He estimates that a good road can be constructed this distance for the sum of \$4,000, which his company is furnishing.

The other day Joseph Peplot, with one team, hauled 1,500 pounds of freight to the Blue River Mining Company's mine.
