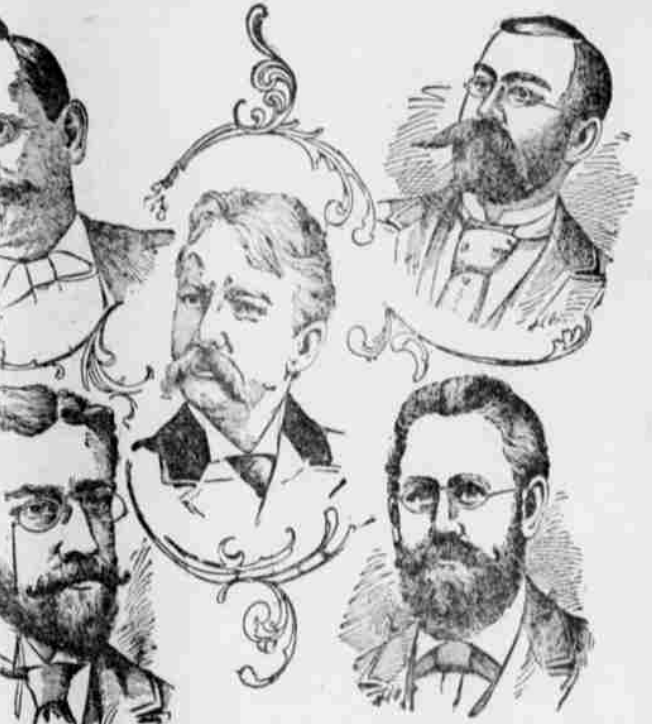

EUGENE DIVINITY SCHOOL

Success of the School a Cause for Thanksgiving.

SUCCESS OF YESTERDAY

Daily Guard Dec 15
Cowles' Memorial Chapel was comfortably filled yesterday at 2:30 p m by those who came to join in a service of thanksgiving and praise for the success of the school. The special cause for gratitude at this time is the fact that the school is now entirely free from debt.

After prayer by Dr. Dale the Divinity School choir rendered an anthem.
Rev M L Rose then spoke of the end during character of this work, of the victory of faith and of the bright hopes of future success.
J A Bushnell, of Junction City, president of the board of regents spoke feelingly of what God had wrought in the building up of the institution and of his own strong faith in the future of the school.

Dr C H Chapman, president of the U of O. was then introduced. He compared the beginning of the divinity school to that of Johns Hopkins University and commended the wisdom and faith that had brought such success to the work.
After another anthem and prayer, Rev W F Cowden of Tacoma, Wash, Superintendent of Christian missions of the Northwest was introduced. He briefly reviewed the history of the school and spoke of the great need that had existed in the Northwest for preachers of the Christian church and how this need is being supplied by the divinity school. Rev Cowden's principal cause of thanksgiving was that the church of the future, both in the Northwest and in other places would be supplied with ministers from this school.

Dean Sanderson then told of the prominent place that prayer had had in the work. He spoke appreciatively of the aid that the students, the secretary and treasurer and the board of regents have given. This faculty of the University, the people of Eugene, the church of the north-west, received merited thanks for encouragement and help. Dean Sanderson does not feel that the work is completed, that in fact it is only begun. Larger fields of opportunity are now open. Every one should have a hand in helping the school to greater usefulness. The property represents an expenditure of \$7,000. The endowment fund now amounts to \$3,600. With what can be raised in the field by judicious effort, enough has been secured to assure the support of the school for the next three years.

It is the confident expectation of all that the church will see more and more the great opportunity here and will supply every need of the school.

ANNUAL RECEPTION

Dean and Mrs E C Sanderson tendered the students of the Divinity School the annual reception last evening from 5 to 7 p m. About forty guests were present including J A and Miss Gertrude Bushnell of Junction City, and Rev W F Cowden of Tacoma. A delicious luncheon was served and a most enjoyable time was had by all present.

Rev W F Cowden of Tacoma, is delivering a series of lectures at the Divinity School at 4 p m, each day this week.

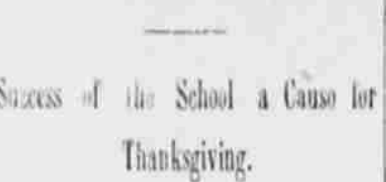

FOR THE SAKE OF OLD TIMES.

Peripatete the Salem Fair and Continue to Pay the Bill.
Eugene, Or, Dec 13.—To the Evening Telegram.—I am in favor of the state appropriating \$5,000 to aid the fair at Salem for a few years longer. At the same time I do not expect it to be a success in any full sense of that term. There are some things whose value is not expressed in dollars and cents. I would maintain the fair at Salem for a time yet, not because it is of great financial value to the state, but because it is one of the few old pioneer institutions left to us. It represents some of the best thought and effort of our fathers. I was born in this state and for forty years "the fair" has been an annual event in my life. I suppose I am only one of thousands of native sons and pioneers who would feel that in losing the old-fashioned fair they would be losing an old friend and one of the most pleasant reminders of the "early days."

An old man is not of much value, but we are generally willing to let him live a while for the work he has done. So we are willing to help the fair to live a while yet for the pleasures with which it has filled our youthful days and dreams.
I suppose newcomers cannot appreciate the sentimental side of the fair. But for many years it was the only state festival—the only thing which drew the whole people of the state together. Whether this sentiment is wise or not it is widespread, and would cry aloud at any attempt to destroy our one institutional relic of pioneer days.

FEEDING STARVING CUBANS

Our Government Spending Large Sums For Food—Runs to the Million.

VESSELS SAILING WITH RATIONS

WASHINGTON, Dec 11.—Since the cessation of hostilities this government has spent about \$1,000,000 in feeding the starving Cubans, and the work is still going on with untiring vigor.

The Comal, about which there was a dispute over permitting the entry of supplies which is carried, took 1,200,000 rations to the province of Havana. The Hatten and Port Victor carried a million rations each to the starving Cubans, and the Comal is now at Savannah with 1,200,000 rations, and will be ready to sail in a day or two. It is estimated that these rations cost in round numbers \$1,000,000.

Besides this, about 5,000,000 were left at Santiago after the campaign before that city, but have been used by the American troops and distributed among the Cubans.
