CAPITAL IS INTERESTED

Lane County Timber Attracts Attention.

TOUR OF INSPECTION

Saw Mills, Paper Mills and Box Factories Contemplated.

\$2,500,000 SEEKS UTILITY
Daily Guard, Jan 5
Is Lane county to have new industries and more capital invested within its boundaries?

The question appears to be at a status where it will be answered without need of any local assistance.
The GUARD yesterday stated that a party of gentlemen left this city that day on an inspecting tour, their objective points being Springfield and the McKenzie river.

Following is the party: A J Hetchman, G X Wendling and H Fleischaker, of San Francisco, W M Sims of Sacramento, F H Buck of Vacaville, R A Booth of Grant's Pass, J H Booth of Roseburg and J F Kelly, Z S Cather and G H Kelly, of Saginaw. They were accompanied by Mayor Kuykendall, T G Hendricks, S H Friendly, E Bangs and County Surveyor Collier.

These gentlemen arrived in a special car and at once made arrangements for their investigations. They did not make known any of their plans, merely occupying themselves with the necessary details of their inspection.

It is learned that the gentlemen have under consideration varied interests—these being more definitely defined as the saw mill, paper mill, and box factory industries. The Messrs Booth, Kelley and Cather own the large saw mills at Saginaw, and the other gentlemen represent more directly the paper interests, some of them being stockholders and directors in the Crown paper mills at Oregon City.

Leaving here by private conveyance the party went to Springfield, inspected the water power there, and then went to the Hayden bridge. At this point C M Collier and D V Kuykendall acting as civil engineers, took soundings and measurements, for the future reference of the party.

It is said the men have an option on 60,000 acres of timber land on the Mohawk, which is one of the finest timber sections in Oregon.
From the Hayden bridge the party proceeded on foot down the river to Seavey's ferry, and to the site of the old saw mill on the Spencer place, closely inspecting the river the entire distance. They then went to the Armature farm, north of this city, and after viewing portions of it drove to Coburg. The Goodale property was inspected closely, and the necessary information gathered for future consideration. Returning, the party arrived at Eugene at 6 o'clock. They left this morning in their special car for Oregon City, and the California men will return to their homes from that point.

INFORMATION SUMMARIZED.
General report says that the gentlemen have taken the preliminary steps toward incorporating with paid-up capital stock of \$2,500,000. With this amount of capital they expect to operate saw mills with a capacity of 100,000,000 feet of lumber per year, of which the Saginaw mills will contribute 30,000,000 feet; a paper mill, using balm and cottonwood, with a capacity to equal or exceed any paper mill on the coast; a box and basket factory.

The men have the capital necessary to engage in all these enterprises, and it only remains to be seen whether they consider this section feasible for their location.
What influence these industries would have on Eugene and Lane county, it would be hard to estimate. Besides utilizing the vast ranges of forest, and employing hundreds of men, it means the section contiguous to Eugene would become a manufacturing center of no mean proportions. One of the results they contemplate is a canal from the

McKenzie to the Willamette, thus uniting all their interests and giving untold power for the operation of the machinery. This project is not new. It has been considered before, with flattering prospects, lack of capital being the only thing which has prevented its being built before this.

It would not be too much to say that, following as a natural result, branch line railways through this section would then become a necessity, building up all interests together—fruit orchards, farms and gardens alike receiving the benefit from them.
The state at large but Lane county and Eugene in particular will await the decision of these capitalists with considerable interest. They will be fortunate if they locate here, and Lane county will be greatly advanced by their presence.

REBELS READY FOR TROUBLE
Declare the Americans Will Not Be Allowed to Land Armed.
MANILA, Jan 3.—Advices just received from Manila say that the rebels at their meeting Saturday ratified the action of the delegation which assured the Americans they might land unarmed, but if the latter landed armed the natives would be uncontrollable.
It is further said every preparation is being made for resistance on the part of the rebels, and reinforcements are arriving from Negros and neighboring islands in spite of the efforts of the United States cruiser Baltimore and the gunboat Arizona to scare them with searchlights. The American troops are restless; the rebels are drilling on the beach evening and morning in full view of the American expedition, which is still afloat.

MASSACRED BY NATIVES.
On New Subjects Perpetrate Atrocities in the Philippines.
MADRID, Jan 3.—General Rios cables from Manila, confirming the report that all the Spaniards at Balabac, an island of the Philippine group, 30 miles south of Palawan, have been assassinated, with the exception of the women, whose release is being asked for.

LATE ALASKA NEWS

Indians Crazy by Liquor Commit Outrages—Mails Blockaded Awaiting Ice.

Butter and Tobacco Cornered.
Tacoma, Wash, Jan 3.—Passengers who arrived on the Al-Ki from Alaska, some of whom left Dawson as late as December 3, report that the Chilkoot Indians are terrorizing the white inhabitants of Pyramid harbor, near Skagway, and have threatened to massacre them.
The night before Christmas whites appeared at the Chilkoot village with a big supply of whisky, which was sold to the Indians without reserve. The entire tribe got drunk Christmas, and with knives and guns compelled all the whites in that locality to leave. When the Al-Ki left Skagway no blood had been shed, but trouble was imminent.
On reaching Indian river the miners were informed that two men, names unknown, had frozen to death on the Yukon between Fort Selkirk and Dawson. They were guarding a snow load of frozen dressed beef, and perished one exceptionally cold night in November.
Several tons of mail for Dawson are blockaded at Lake Bennett, awaiting ice transportation. The winter has been so open that Lake Bennett remained unfrozen up to December 23.
In October speculators cornered the butter and tobacco market at Dawson, and since then both articles have been bringing from \$2 to \$3 a pound.

WEDNESDAY, JAN 4
SECOND TRIAL.—The second trial of Fayne Moore will begin in New York on January 19. Her lawyer, Abraham Levy, says he has evidence which will render her acquittal inevitable if the trial comes off, which he will try to prevent. The trial will be before another judge. A dispatch says: "The woman's loyalty to what she declares to be the truth and her devotion to Moore's interests prevent her being released. She has had two opportunities to gain her liberty, one by swearing against Moore and another by pleading guilty, with a suspension of sentence. She declined both propositions, although advised by her counsel that she was in great peril."

INSANE.—Mrs Luella Yarnell, wife of J E Yarnell, aged 33 years, was examined this morning on a charge of insanity by Medical Examiners, Drs T W Harris and L W Brown and was ordered committed to the asylum at Salem for treatment. The lady while at a social gathering about two weeks ago first showed signs of derangement. She is highly respected by her neighbors and it is earnestly hoped that a few weeks treatment at the hospital will fully restore her mind. She was taken to the asylum on this forenoon, local train by Sheriff W W Withers and her husband, J E Yarnell, as guard.

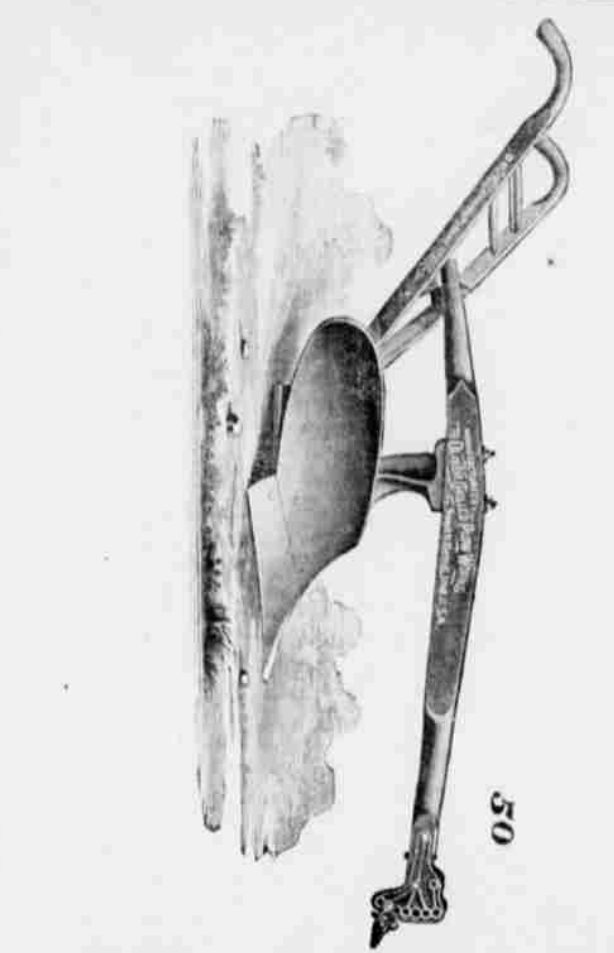

AGREED TO CONSOLIDATE. Cottage Grove and Lemati Settle Their Troubles in Union.

Cottage Grove, Jan 4.—At a mass meeting tonight, the citizens of Cottage Grove and Lemati approved the charter under which the two towns are consolidated under the old name of Cottage Grove. Some opposition to the movement was expected from many of the residents of Lemati, but it did not materialize, although a number of persons who were outspoken against consolidation were present. Their failure to make any fight in the open meeting is accounted for by the supposition that they either consider the whole proceeding illegal, or they will attempt to defeat the charter in the legislature.
L F Woolley acted as chairman of the meeting. Immediately after he called for one of the obstacles to consolidation was removed. This was the Cottage Grove waterworks, which were offered to the city for \$3500. A duly executed option for one year was presented to the meeting. Then the proposed charter was taken up and read. It was a well-executed document and provides for a good city government. On motion it was approved, and the next movement will be to secure its passage by the legislature.
