PHILIPPINE PRODUCTS.

A Manila correspondent of the Albany Democrat has this regarding our new possessions on the Asiatic shores of the great Pacific: "The chief product of these islands is hemp, from which all of the Manila rope is made, next is tobacco. There are over 200,000 cigars used daily in Manila. Most everybody smokes here. I send you a box of some of the different cigars manufactured here. You can buy cigars here from 1c to 7c American money. You can get the best made for 7c, which would cost 25 cts in Albany. Each factory employs not less than 1000 men, women, and children. One of the La Insular factories employs 2800.

"Rice is the next product. When we entered the city all of the churches were stacked full of rice, where they had hurried it in to live on. Sugar cane is about next, then bananas, native oranges, peaches, coconuts, betelnuts, mangoes, in fact all kinds of tropical fruits. As to wheat I don't know whether they raise any or not. It is reported that they raise a little back in the mountain valleys, but have not seen any so far. They raise a kind of barley, but it is not a kind that grows in the United States."

PANAY ISLAND.

Ilo Ilo, the second city of the Philippine islands, now in the hands of the insurgents, is situated on the island of Panay, some of 250 miles southeast of Manila. Admiral Dewey and General Otis are sending a force there to compel the insurgents to recognize the authority of the United States.

Panay has an area of 4000 square miles. There is no estimate of the number of inhabitants on which dependence can be placed; but they may exceed half a million. Sugar is the main industry. The business interests of Ilo Ilo are almost entirely in the hands of English and German firms. Exports of sugar exceed those of Manila, and the whole town smells of it.

The town lies close to the seashore, but is reached by means of a sluggish creek, which has been dredged out until it will admit the island steamers. Large vessels must lie in the channel outside, where there is good anchorage. The channel between Panay and the next island is five to eight miles wide. Ilo Ilo is built on low ground, much of which is filled swamp land. It is not an attractive place.

A GOOD KIDNAP.

Newspaper reports from the range districts of Eastern Oregon say that great numbers of range horses will perish this winter for lack of feed. These low-grade range horses have been a nuisance for a long time. A good many have found their way to the Linton cannery, but thousands remain and eat up grass which would otherwise be better used by cattle or sheep. It does not appear to be an easy matter, however, to

DRAGGONED — Boliver Cogswell was undragged on Wednesday night at Harrisburg last Wednesday night and robbed of about \$5 in money, all he had on his person, and \$60 or \$70 in notes and certificates of deposit. He had been attending the Woodmen lodge at that place and went to his horse when the assassin stepped out of a dark alley and struck him down. He was unconscious about 30 minutes. When found his vest was torn off of him as was also his coat, and his pockets turned inside out. Just across the street a number of people were in the office of the hotel, showing the description of his assailant. Mr Cogswell is now able to be up and is at his home near Halsey, but is still suffering from the effects of the blow, which was just above the left ear. Mr Cogswell handles considerable money in purchasing cattle, hay, etc., and was quite lucky in not having more money in his pocket. COMMISSIONERS SIGNED

Gov. T. T. Geer signed commissions for his recent appointees of the State University of Oregon, and trustee for the Soldiers' Home, who were approved by the senate immediately after their nomination by the governor. The gentlemen so commissioned are: University regents—Hon. C. A. Dolph, of Portland, to succeed Henry Failing, deceased, to serve for the term ending April 15, 1903, Hon. R. S. Bean, of Salem, to succeed Hon. A. Bush, for the term expiring April 15, 1905, Hon. Wm. Smith, of Baker City, to succeed Hon. A. G. Hovey, deceased, of Eugene, for the term ending April 15, 1908. Soldiers' Home—Hon. S. H. Holt, of Jackson county, to succeed John F. Robertson, for the term expiring February 12, 1901.

A TRIAL

County Judge Potter and a jury, consisting of W. P. Cheshire, Henry Kompp, O. A. McMahan, A. J. Chapman, S. B. Jackson and E. Turpen, are hearing a civil suit wherein L. Simmons is plaintiff and W.
